Equalizing Gold and Silver.

One way of equalizing more nearly the supply of the two metals will be tried this year that has not yet been resorted to so far as to extract. This is the way of mining of the known gold mines for all there is in them. Silver has been depressed so long that except in uncommonly rich mines it does not pay to extract the ore. Consequently the attention of capitalists turns more and more to economic and improved methods of extracting gold. This will be a great gold mining year if the present market is to continue. A new way of working quartz is called the cyanide of potassium process. By this method quartz that was formerly not thought worth anything can be made into a fine quantity of gold and yellow metal. Placer gold is the gold washed out of veins or lodes by the action of water. Recently attention has been given to inventions which bring out the gold in the form of a precipitate that can be obtained under the old water-washing process. A powerful air exhaust pumping machine upon a flat bottomed boat brings up in great quantity and need not be used in streams where placer gold is found. Hydraulic machinery will now wash down a whole mountain if necessary. On the whole, there need not be any great anxiety about the business of 1894; this is the world's gold supply considerably increased.

Galapagos.

Unfortunately it was a little previous, so to speak—the announcement that a treaty had been concluded with Ecuador for the movement of the United States of a coaling station on the Galapagos islands. It is a thing that ought to be yet, however. Perhaps the story will bring out its own materialization like the fact that Charles Cook was a friend in Australia. By the time the letter reached Australia the lie had become a truth, and the occurrence had been investigated and settled. We have now two coaling stations, the Pacific hedges, and the stations in extremity of South America at the southern Pacific. One is at San Pedro de Macoris, in Sanago the other, Pearl and Harbor, is in Hawaii at the mouth of Pearl river, near Honolulu. The United States should by all means have on the Galapagos islands. There are three points to be pointed into which both merchant and naval ships could put for repairs and coal supplies. With our ever increasing commercial interests in the Pacific, we should have coaling stations within its reach everywhere. The Galapagos islands are under the equator on the direct route from South American ports to Honolulu. They are 700 miles from the South American coast and about 400 from Hawaii. This group is also on the direct route between San Francisco and Valparaiso. Chatham is the island that has been mentioned as the most desirable for the location of a coaling station. One or two vessels of the new navy might linger around their permission if we had possession and be to our reach of either Hawaii or the South American ports. The Galapagos are uninhabited by any human residents, which perhaps is all the better. They ought to be called the "Islands of the Unknown and the Unknown." The flora and fauna present a rich field of exploration to the scientist, while the novel sight makes them the scene of many a wild, weird and thrilling tale. The birds of this remote island might be attracted and finally carried off by one of the moosey parties which come as a survival of the fittest.

A BRILLIANT NAVAL BALL.

The Flower of the Nation Greeted the Admirals.

NEW YORK, April 28.—When the last warship sailed out of the harbor what the average New Yorker will not know about naval affairs, naval etiquette, equipment and kindred subjects will not be worth knowing. AN EXTRA SESSION SURE

The President Says He Will Call One in September.

NOT HELDED EARLIER THAN THAT.

This Means That the Financial Situation Does Not Demand the Attention of Congress Just Now—The War Department Commented From New York at Present.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—President Cleveland has decided to call an extra session of congress only if the financial situation should demand it.

Mr. Kilgore had inquired at the White House on the subject before leaving for home, stating that he wished to bring his family here before congress convened and inquired for that reason.

The president will not call congress in special session before Sept. 4 unless some unforeseen circumstance rendered an earlier call necessary.

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ONE HUNDRED VICTIMS
