EDITORIAL NOTES

The People's Cause in Belgium.
Belgium is a constitutional hereditary monarchy. Two houses, a senate and chamber of representatives, constitute the legislative power. Representatives and senators have been hitherto elected by the votes of male citizens 21 years old and over who paid annual taxes to the amount of about \$5 or more. This method of election has been the cause of the Belgian workingmen from voting. As a matter of fact, the Belgian legislature has been elected by votes of about 1 in 10 of the adult males of the country. The nation was practically run and owned by the rich manufacturers and middle class. King Leopold himself has been in favor of universal manhood suffrage, but the nobles would not permit it. They elected whom they pleased to the assembly, and their tools passed exactly the laws the masters demanded. The lot of the Belgian factory operative, hewer of wood, or laborer was harder than that of any other of his class in Europe, except perhaps in Russia. No legislation shortening hours of work or fixing the duties and liabilities of employers could be passed.

This was the distinctive grievance of the common people in Belgium. A special session of parliament had been called to revise the Belgian constitution. The extension of suffrage was the burning question they had to deal with. The chamber of representatives voted against taking it up at all. Then the working people all over Belgium struck work and marched through the streets of the towns rioting, fighting and demanding a revision of the vote of the representatives. The result of the revolution was that there were fights between the police and the workingmen and women. The first martyr to the cause of universal suffrage was a woman in Jolindon, who was killed by police men as she went to work while she was working for the right of men to vote.

Dynamic was brought to bear to enforce the strikers' demand for universal suffrage. In Jolindon all Ghent there was a tremendous riot. The strikers drove off the police who tried to disperse them, and it was not till a military troop arrived and charged them that they scattered. In Antwerp the very women and children left their homes and marched through the streets with guns in their hands to help the down-trodden workingmen in their rights. The only thing that has all detracts from the story is the fact that in many instances the down-trodden workingmen got essay drunk and were unmanfully.

There is scarcely a shadow of doubt that in a few days more a revolution would have occurred and Belgium been proclaimed a republic. But the members of the house of representatives were frightened out of their senses, decided together in a hurry and hedged that they would take up the question of suffrage at this session and it is plain enough. Then, with a dynamic bomb practically under their seats, they quickly passed an act granting suffrage to all male Belgians 21 years old and over, but gave no time to the legislature to make any certain amount of property and three to those who in addition to property have also a certain amount of learning. The politico-industrial strikers accept that the measure as the most historic steps in the march of human progress was taken. The strikers say they will agitate peacefully till they have the root of their demands, which is plain manhood suffrage without any trills.

If the chamber of representatives had persisted in its refusal to revise the suffrage law, the streets of Brussels would have run with blood. An army of 25,000 desperate strikers stood waiting to enforce their right to vote by fighting for it. We congratulate the workingmen of Belgium on their great victory. We approve of all they did except getting drunk. It was a labor strike to gain political rights.

The law under which Secretary Carle may come to give out gold certificates was passed in 1882. It provided that whenever gold coin in a sum of not less than \$50 should be presented at the United States treasury the presenter should receive in return therefor treasury notes of a denomination not less than \$50, certifying that on demand the treasury would again pay out the gold coin. The gold certificates, interchangeable with the gold coins, circulated instead of this, thus preventing the wear and tear of the coin. The same law of 1882 provided, however, that when the gold reserve in the United States treasury should fall below \$100,000,000 the treasury shall cease paying out the gold certificates in exchange for gold coin. This provision of the act prevents speculation from draining the treasury of its gold and holding for their own purposes.

There seems to be a general tendency among civilized nations to lower the birth rate. In Hamburg in 1892 there were 2,500 fewer births than deaths, not to mention the large number of children, which numbered 30,912, a terrible record for one city.

Since the middle of February, 1893, we have seen of the country nearly \$100,000,000 in gold. But we shall get considerable of it back during the World's Fair exhibition.
