Cardinal Newman's Gentleness.

Cardinal Newman somewhere in his writings depicts the ideal of a gentleman. It is in the beginning that it is almost a definition of a gentleman to say that he is one who never inflicts pain. This is the negative side of the definition. The positive side is that the gentleman should engage himself in removing obstacles to the well being and convenience of those about him. He is as comfortable to have around as a good man, when the thermometer is at zero. He is careful to leave people to do as they please in a free and unrestrained way, never interfering with or embarrassing them. It would indeed be a gentleman who was large minded enough to do this. So willing is Cardinal Newman's gentleman to have other enjoy themselves in their own way that he is constantly engaged in removing the obstacles that would stand in their way.

"He has his eyes on all his company. He is tender toward the bashful, gentle toward the distant and merciful toward the erring." In his conversation the gentleman will remember to whom he is speaking, have thought for all the company and avoid allusions that would give pain to any of them, steering away from all topics that irritate. When he goes to bed he will not be disturbed by many of the gentlemen who will come to him. It is not that he is receiving the benefit of conferring it.

"He is never mean or little in his disposition. Moreover, he will only use his intellect far above the average in the fact that he never mistakes personalities and sharp sayings for arguments. He is never kinder to those who are mean and looser to him, he submits to pain because it is inevitable. He never takes with heroic philosophy because it is irreparable. He goes to bed without a murmur because it is destiny."

As if all this were not hard enough in order to be a gentleman, the cardinal adds the requirement that he should be a good talker. He will never talk about himself at all, except when he is compelled to, and never impute unworthy motives to another. One qualification of the gentleman might well be that he should never talk about himself, "He has no ears for gossip or slander."
