

TWO MORE WRECKED.

GRISTPORT, N. Y., Dec. 7.—There are two wrecked vessels off the coast near Gristport. Both were ashore during Tuesday night's storm. One vessel is the tugboat, the other is a schooner. The tugboat is from New York to New Bedford. She is on the beach off Gristport.

The schooner from New York on Thursday, laden in ballast and commanded by Captain H. W. Morse. Deane & Co. of Boston are her owners. She encountered rough weather on Saturday and continued to be storm beaten until she went on the rocks.

Captain Morse thinks the schooner's bottom was stove in when she first struck. Water came in the rocks the crew had a terrible experience. The wind drove the schooner into the rocks until it was impossible to leave the storm. The ship rolled badly, and the ice on the decks rendered it hard to keep her feet. The second wreck lies on the shore opposite Gristport. When ship is in or what the fate of those on board is not known. About 10 o'clock Tuesday night the schooner was seen sighted. The wreck was discovered in the morning. There are no living stations on the north shore of Long Island Sound. The beach is strewn with lumber and other things. It is believed the second wreck is that of a schooner from New York to New Bedford. It is feared that all of her crew are lost.

Thirty-four Wrecks Lost.

HE WAS ABOUT TO DIE.

Judge Carrow's Cousin Taken Poison Six Times.
AND HE HAS NOT SUCCEEDED YET.

HE HAS TRIED CHLORFORM, AND HAS TRIED TO TAKE POISON SIX TIMES.
AND HE HAS NOT SUCCEEDED YET.

CAMDEN, N. J., Dec. 7.—Richard Carrow, a young druggist from Camden, Dec. 7, was taken to the city hall for the first time on his own life. He is less than a week old. He is a very intelligent young man, and is an excellent family physician. He has been successful in his profession, and his family is in a comfortable and happy state. He has no need to allow worries over financial matters to drive him to suicide. He is a cousin of Judge Howard Carrow, a well known lawyer of this city, and a nephew of George McKay of Burlington.

Carrow's present trouble section first became known to the police in Philadelphia last Thursday afternoon, when he was found unconscious in the street in this city. He was taken to a hospital, rendered to his normal condition and was dismissed. It was the impression of the physicians there that he had taken chlorform.

On Friday morning at an early hour he was again picked up by the police and taken to another hospital, rendered and discharged. He was then taken to this institution but a few hours when he was returned by the police to the former one.

A Story to Chicago.
A careful investigation and close questioning of the young man showed him to be a confirmed victim of the chloroform habit. He gave the name of Young and Miller, but finally gave his correct name, Friends took charge of him, and he was dismissed.

That same afternoon he was found at the corner of Fifth and Federal streets, this city, lying in the street. He was taken to the Cooper hospital, where an empty bottle was found on him labeled "Chloroform." After his restoration he was taken to the city hall and locked up.

Sumner Mr. McKay, his uncle, came here from Burlington, and upon Carrow's promise to behave himself the uncle took him to his home, and Carrow remained there in his promise to keep his hands off the deadly drug that had so much harm for him.

The family retired on Monday night, and that was the last the uncle saw of his nephew. He had not heard from him since. During the night, Carrow was taken to the hospital, and he was found in a very bad condition. He was brought to a hospital in this city and once more restored.

The police again took charge of him. As he was taken into the police quarters he turned to the officers and said: "Well, gentlemen, I've done this time. I've taken chloroform. See?" And he opened his mouth, displaying two tablets on his tongue.

Saved Again by Antidote.
Quickly he chewed them up and attempted to swallow them. At a moment two officers had him and a third had summoned the hospital physician. The tablets were administered, and he was taken to the hospital. He was found in a very bad condition. He was brought to a hospital in this city and once more restored.

Shadow Faces.
