Council authorizes drainage bonding

A total of \$20,000 in water-drainage improvements to various streets was authorized by the Township Council on Sept. 20 when it unanimously adopted an ordinance appropriating that amount, and authorizing the issuance of \$19,000 in bonds or notes and a \$1,000 down payment.

The measure calls for the installation of storm-water sewers with required catch basins, manholes, curb replacement, pavement reconstruction, fittings and appurtenances at Willow Way, Durham Dr., Maurice Ave., Kenneth Pl., East La., Hillside Ave., Della Terr., Terhune Rd., Forest Dr., Hayes Ave. and Popular and Orchard Terraces.

Introduced at the session was an ordinance setting the minimum and maximum salaries for the assistant tax assessor and for the welfare director.

The public hearing and possible final adoption of that measure will be held on

Monday, Oct. 18, at 8 p.m.

New tools to improve leaf pickup

The purchase of a front-end loader and a leaf rake for a township street sweeper to make leaf pickup easier this fall was authorized when the Township Council on Sept. 20 adopted a \$72,000 ordinance for the purchase of equipment for the Public Works Dept.

Also adopted was a measure providing for \$39,600 for street improvements to Ivy St., Ruddy Pl., Hutchinson St. and Schmidt Ln. by reconstruction and resurfacing.

Final approval was also given to an ordinance amending the ordinance to provide for improvements at the local municipal pool to include volleyball, basketball and tetherball courts.

In the report of the Swimming Pool Committee, of which he is the chairman, Councilman at Large George Sanguliano said contracts would soon be signed, since the remainder of the improvements, which added no new funds to the ordinance, have been okayed by the Governing Body.

Councilman Sanguliano added he had received a letter from a resident complaining the pool on its swimming lessons, and promising to join for the next season.

Also adopted was an ordinance establishing the annual salary for deputy tax assessor, Theresa Enright, at \$22,000, effective tomorrow.

In another report, Safety Committee chairman, Councilman at Large Fred Eckel, reported he has been in touch with the township police and the county officials in an effort to eliminate traffic tieups on Raritan Rd.

Both Councilman Eckel and Second Ward Councilwoman Jean Anderson explained they must direct their efforts, along with those of Councilman at Large Joseph B. Pozniak, in resolving the, situation through county officials since Raritan Rd. is owned by Union County.

They added Walter Gardner, the county traffic engineer, has been cooperating with the local officials in trying to remedy the situation.

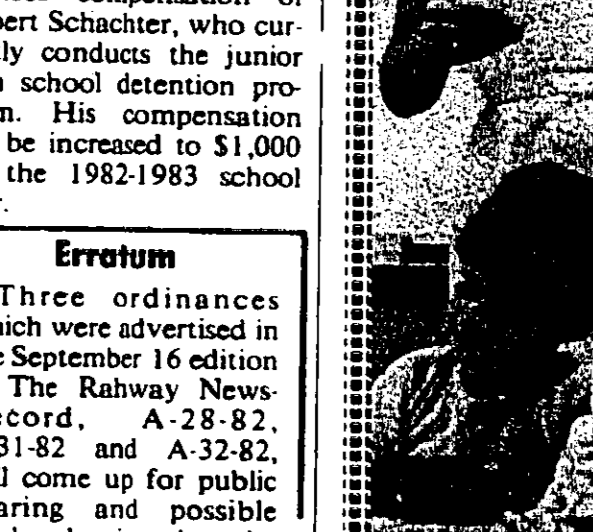
