Future of rent-control law to be decided on Tuesday



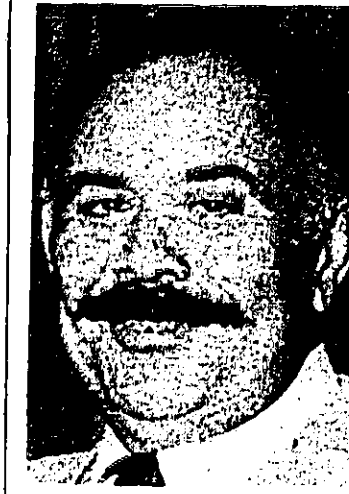

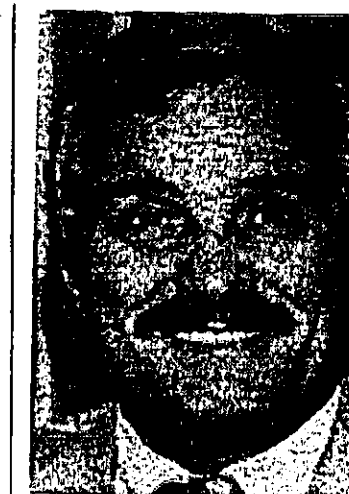

Three major issues will face Clark voters, only, on Tuesday, Nov. 2.

The question of rent control, which has been heatedly debated for two years, since the passage of a 7 to 8% yearly limit on rent increases at that time, and the subject of several legal proceedings, will be decided by a referendum on the present measure.

Voters will be asked if an initiative petition submitted by a group of residents opposed to the continuation of

fect on the tax base.

The Township Council, which is now controlled by a 5-2 Republican majority, could shift back to the Democratic control it had in the past if the Democrats should capture all four ward Council positions.

The president of the governing body, the First Ward Republican Councilwoman Virginia Apellan, will be facing the Democratic challenger, Raymond B. Krov.

Mrs. Apellan was elected as the representative of the First Ward in 1978. She had served first in township government in 1976, when she was appointed to fill an unexpired term as the councilwoman-at-large.

She formerly served as a member of the Mayor's Committee on Drug Abuse, and is a member of the Union County Environmental Committee. She formerly served as an administrative aide of former Assemblyman William Maguire, who represented Clark, from 1976 to 1978.

A former member and a vice president of the Clark

Board of Education, Mr. Krov is an instructor of accounting, finance and management and the vice chairman of the faculty at Union County College.

The owner of Woodland Landscaping in Clark is a graduate of the township's public schools. He holds a bachelor of science degree in accounting from Seton Hall University in South Orange and a masters degree in business administration from Rutgers University in New Brunswick.

He is studying for his masters in business administration in finance at Seton Hall.

The race in the Second Ward, between the incumbent, Republican, Jean Anderson, and the Democrat, George C. Nucera, will be a rematch.

When the Democratic councilman, Bernard Hayden, resigned the Second Ward seat last year because he moved into the First Ward, Mr. Nucera was appointed to fill the post, and was subsequently defeated in Nov., 1981, by Mrs. Anderson.

A secretary for Schering Plough, Inc. in Kenilworth, Mrs. Anderson has been a township resident since Feb., 1961. She attended both the Nancy Taylor Secondary School in Plainfield and the Clark Regional High School in Clark. She was the 1981 program chairperson for the Clark Regional Club, and is the governing body's liaison to the Clark Planning Board.

An administrator with the Belleville school system, Mr. Nucera has been employed in that school district for 28 years. An 18-year Clark resident, he received his bachelor of arts degree from Montclair State College in Upper Montclair in accounting and his master of arts degree from Montclair State College in education for more than 16 years.

In the Third Ward, where the Democratic Councilman Donald W. Labelle decided not to seek re-election, and is a member of the Ladies Auxiliaries of both the Clark Post of the Veterans

of Foreign Wars and the Clark Volunteer Fire Dept. In the Fourth Ward, the Democratic incumbent running for re-election, Peter M. Campana, will be facing the son of a former Democratic councilman, John Bodnar, Jr.

Mr. Campana, who won the seat vacated by Mr. Bodnar, the Fourth Ward representative in 1980, will be facing the GOP contender, John Bodnar, 3rd.

Councilman Campana is a local Realtor and the former president of the Parkway Board of Realtors, now the Parkway Clark Board of Realtors, of which he is still a member. He has lived in the township since 1957.

The councilman served as the chairman of the Board of Adjustment for four of his six years on that body. He was also the chairman of the Mayor's Enforcement Committee and a former commander of the Jersey City Post No. 52 of the American Legion.

A life-long resident of Clark, having attended the

Clark public school system and Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in the township, Mr. Bodnar earned a bachelor of arts degree from Hobart College of Geneva, New York, with a double major in history and American Studies and a minor in political science. He was a member of Kappa Sigma International Fraternity.

The GOP candidate is currently employed by the William Ford Associates of Florham Park as a junior associate/associate consultant to the Home Life Insurance Co. of New York.

In the newly-aligned Seventh Congressional District incumbent Republican representative, Matthew J. Rinaldo, will face the former New Jersey state director of consumer affairs, Adam K. Levin, the Democratic nominee, and Donald Siano of Farwood, the Libertarian.

Seeking his sixth term in the House of Representatives, Rep. Rinaldo received a bachelor of science degree from Rutgers University, a master's degree in public ad-

ministration from Seton Hall University and a doctorate in public administration from New York University.

Elected as the president of the Union Township Zoning Board in 1963, he became a freeholder that year, and served in the State Senate for five years, from 1967 to 1972, when he won his first term in Congress.

Mr. Levin, who lost to Rep. Rinaldo in 1974, is a graduate of the Stanford University School of Law. Appointed the consumer affairs director in 1977 by the former Gov. Brendan Byrne, he had worked in the office for a year as a volunteer under the former director, Virginia Long.

He continued as the director through the end of Gov. Byrne's second term. He was responsible for returning \$26 million to New Jersey consumers.

County, state races attract cornucopia of experience

In addition to selecting local officials, voters in Rahway and Clark will also be casting ballots for a United States senator, a Union County surrogate and four county freeholders.

The fight for United States senator is among Rep. Millicent Fenwick, a Republican; a Democratic nominee, Frank Lautenberg, and several independent candidates among them, Mrs. Rose Monyk of Rahway.

Representing the state's Fifth Congressional District in the House of Representatives since 1974, Mrs. Fenwick served in the State Assembly from 1970 to 1973. She then became the state director of consumer affairs, a post she served in until her election to the House of Representatives. She was re-elected to the

House post in 1976, 1978 and 1980.

Mr. Lautenberg, the president of Automatic Data Processing, a company he started, is a former commissioner of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. He also founded a center for cancer research and is noted for several philanthropic activities.

Mrs. Monyk is a life-long Democrat. She served as a member of the committees for referenda on the Rahway Fire Headquarters in 1974 and on the Rahway City Hall in 1978. She was elected as a Democratic attorney dealing with estates, wills and trusts. The associate counsel for the Union County Board of Social Services, she is a member of the Union County Bar Assn., the president of the Women Lawyers in

Union County and a former administrative assistant to the United States Veterans Administration.

The four Republican nominees for freeholder, Blanche Banasiak, Bernard G. Yarusavage, Robert C. Miller and John Kulish, will be facing Democrats, Thomas W. Long, Charlot DeFilippo, Walter Boright and Jerry Green.

The chairman of the Freeholder Board, Mrs. Banasiak was the chairwoman of the last Elizabeth City Charter Study Commission, and was the first woman elected to chair the Elizabeth Republican Party. She served as the vice chairman of the Freeholder Board and was the vice chairwoman of the Elizabeth Flood Control Committee.

She also served on the Narcotics Enforcement Officers Assn. and the county

planning board.

The mayor of Clark since 1973, Freeholder Yarusavage is in his first year as a freeholder. He has also served as a Clark councilman, a Planning Board member and a director of the New Jersey Conference of Mayors. He attended Rutgers University's Institute of Labor Management, and is employed by the Exxon Research and Engineering Co. in Linden.

Freeholder Miller was the mayor of Berkeley Heights, and has served on the borough's governing body for two terms. He is a member of the Board of Directors of Communities on Cable-Public Access, Television and the Local Finance Board of the New Jersey Dept. of Community Affairs. He is employed as a seminar leader by the American Telephone and Tele-

graph Co.

A fire commissioner and a former mayor of Hillside, Mr. Kulish served as the president of the Hillside Board of Education during 1981. He was also on the Planning Board, and was the chairman of the Hillside Welfare Board. He is a supervisor of aeronautical tool design at Plessey Dynamics.

The lone incumbent Democrat on the Board of Freeholders, Mr. Long has served as an assistant superintendent of schools in Linden since 1972. He has also served as a teacher, vice principal and principal. Freeholder Long holds degrees from East Stroudsburg State College and Rutgers University. He has also served as the chairman of the Mayor's Education Committee on Narcotics in Linden and as a freeholder director.
