## Township seniors receive their own office in Charles H. Brewer School facilities

The use of the Charles H. Brewer School in Clark, which was closed for township public school purposes at the end of the last school year, by township civic groups received its first push on Sept. 13 when the Board of Education approved the use of the stage office near the old gymnasium by the Clark Senior Citizens Co-ordinating Committee.

In a related matter the education body approved the use of the Brewer physical education facilities in the gymnasium from Monday to Saturday, Nov. 28 of this year, to Feb. 23 of next year, and on Baseball Field No. 1 from Monday to Saturday during the period from March 19 to June 8 of next year, by Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School, subject to modification or withdrawal by Board action.

At present the facility is also being used by the Union County Educational Services Commission, and there have been reports it is being considered for use for township offices or the school system's Child Study Team or to house the Board's own offices, which are now located on Schindler Rd.

However, none of the reported uses have been finally approved as yet.

In other action the school body:

- Accepted the receipt of its audit report, prepared by Amann, Fisher and Co., for the fiscal year from July 1, 1982, to June 30, of this year, with no recommendations made.
- Approved the application for a Clinical Laboratory License School Strep Program for the calendar year 1984 at a maximum cost of \$30 to the New Jersey State Dept. of Health's Division of Public Health and Environmental Laboratories Clinical Laboratory Improvement Program.

• Okayed Monday, Oct. 24, as the date for the first staff in-service program for the 1983-1984 school year.

- Authorized the hiring of Mrs. Susan M. Leflar, the associate director of Excel, Inc., the consultants for educational theory and technology, to conduct an in-service workshop on Monday, Oct. 24, at 1 p.m. on brain-damaged children at a maximum fee of \$1,000.
- Tabled its district goals for the present school year.
- Authorized the Board secretary/school business administrator to re-advertise for bids to construct a gymnasium storage area at the Carl H. Kumpf School.

Board members also:

- Okayed the transportation of a handicapped child to the Midland School in North Branch at a maximum cost of \$25 per day pending the clarification of the placement status of the student.
- Approved Mike George, Ray Matlosz, William O'Malley, Thomas Richetti, Edward Kushner, Joseph Nugent and James Peters as sports officials for the current school year.

- Gave their permission for the installation at the Frank K. Hehny School of a digital master clock system that mounts in the school intercom console plus 35 new clocks by Coskey's Electronic Systems of North Brunswick at a maximum cost of \$5,964.
- Approved the addition of teachers, Sherri Lehrman and Lynn Osborne; library aide, Sheila Blazovic; clerk, Mavis Dicker, and custodian, Andrew Kriss, to the 1983-1984 substitute lists.

- Authorized the temporary employment of Stephen Lamont as the treasurer of school monies from July 1 to Aug. 31 of this year and the hiring of Mrs. Betty Jo Ziemer as the treasurer effective on Sept. 1 of this year to Saturday, June 30, of next year, at a stipend of \$1,000.
- Okayed the employment of Mrs. Alice Feibush as a teacher aide to work with handicapped children from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the rate of \$4.85 per hour worked for the current school year.

- Approved the hiring of Mrs. Ruth Sperber as the home instruction teacher for the 1983-1984 school year to be paid at \$9 per hour worked and to be used as needed.
- Gave their permission for the employment of Mrs. Ilene Fischer to teach English to foreign-born students for three hours per day, five days per week, at \$9 per hour worked for the present school year.
- Authorized the employment of the Union County Education Services Commission Child Study Team to re-evaluate 10 handicapped children at a maximum cost of \$600 per case.
- Approved the employment of Mrs. Sylvia Cosentino to work at the Kumpf School library from Sept. 1 to Saturday, Oct. 15, of this year, at \$4.85 per hour worked.
- Okayed the correction of the salary of Mrs. Barbara Russ for the 1983 to 1984 school year from \$20,170 to \$18,900 for placement on the proper step of the appropriate training level of the teacher salary guide in accordance with the agreement between the Board and the Clark Education Assn.
- Accepted the resignation of Mrs. Anna Marie Wyda, a cafeteria/playground aide, effective on Sept. 2 of this year.
- Authorized the appointment of John E. Conlin as the personnel officer for the 1983-1984 school year.
- Gave its permission for the appointment of Philip Foster as the handicapped compliance officer and affirmative action officer for the present school year.
