Township seniors receive their own office in Charles H. Brewer School facilities

Brewer School in Clark, which was closed for town ship public school purposes at the end of the last school year, by township civic groups received its first push on Sept. 13 when the Board of Education approved the use of the stage office near the old gymnasium by the Clark Senior Citizens Co-ordinating Committee.

In a related matter the education body approved the use of the Brewer phy sical education facilities in the gymnasium from Monday to Saturday, Nov. 28 of this year, to Feb. 23 of next year and on Baseball Field No. 1 from Monday to Sat urday during the period from March 19 to June 8 of next year, by Arthur L. 
