

Local Primary races have few mysteries

Besides making their choices in the Democratic and Republican Primaries for presidential nominees, delegates to the party conventions and nominees for United States senator, Congressional representative and freholder, township voters will also vote for nominees for mayor and councilman-at-large and cast ballots for members of their respective party municipal committees on Tuesday, June 5.

All candidates for township-wide office are unopposed in their respective races, although there are seven vacancies to be filled in the Primaries in the party committees.

Republican Mayor Bernard G. Yarusavage has been the township's chief executive since 1973. Before that he was a councilman for eight years and he served a one-year unexpired term on the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders from 1981 to 1982. He was also a member of the Planning Board for 12 years.

A member of the Union County Republican Committee and the Clark

Republican Club, he has been a registered Republican since 1947. An employee of the Exxon Research and Engineering Co. for more than 20 years, he presently works in the Research Services Technology Division in Linden. The former president of the Independent Laboratory Employes' Union, he is a life member of the John L. Ruddy Post of the American Legion of Clark.

The mayor has been a resident of Clark for over 30 years.

The Democratic nominee for mayor, Second Ward Councilman George Nucera, is currently the vice president of the Governing Body. He is the chairman of the finance negotiations and Brewer School Transition Team Committees and a member of Council committees on safety, public works and the Board of Education besides being the liaison to the fire department for two years.

A Clark resident for 22 years, he resides at 700 Raritan Rd. A graduate of Union Hill High School in Union City, he received his bachelor of arts degree in accounting from Montclair

State College in Upper Merionide and his masters in arts degree in administration from Montclair State. He has been an educator for 30 years in the Belleville school system, where he has been a teacher, guidance counselor and coach, and is presently the director of federal and state grants.

Running on the Republican line for councilman-at-large are the sole GOP incumbent, George A. Sangiuliano of 500 Parkway Dr., and Liesel Krehan of 107 Tudor Dr. and Thomas Belverio of 47 Richard St.

Councilman Sangiuliano is a graduate of the Professional School of Business, the president and general manager of Sangiuliano Brothers Construction and Fire, Rebuilders, and the president of San-Sab Realty Investors, Inc. in addition to being a licensed real estate salesman.

He has been the president of Clark UNICO and is a charter member of the 1979-1980 Union County district chairman of the Cooley's Anemia Foundation. A member of the legislative committee of the

National Remodelers Assn., he is also the current chairman of the Township Council capital improvement committee.

Mrs. Krehan, a naturalized citizen of the United States, was born in Germany. She moved to the United States in 1950 and to Clark in 1970. She was educated in Germany, where she received her Architecture degree from Edinburgh University in Scotland.

Employed as an assistant dress designer in the New York garment center, she has been active with the Girl Scouts for 30 years, including being a trainer of leaders and instructor of troops on foreign soil. She has co-ordinated Cadette Government Days in Clark, been the bicentennial chairman of the Girl Scouts and the co-chairwoman for Flag Day in Clark. The candidate is a member of the executive board of the Clark Soccer Club, in charge of traveling teams.

Mr. Belverio has been a property owner and tax-

payer in Clark since April, 1974. He served on the Garwood Board of Education from 1970 to 1973 as the chairman of policy and public relations and the chairman of the Planning Board in addition to being a member of the negotiating, personnel and capital improvements committees and Council liaison to the ambulance squad.

He has also been a member of the Union County Solid Waste Advisory Council, the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority and the Union County Community Development Revenue Sharing Committee.

He is employed at United Merchants in Teanock as the assistant director of management information systems and has over 25 years of business experience including 20 years in data processing. He earned an associate of arts degree from Fairleigh Dickinson University and a bachelor of arts degree from Thomas Edison State College.

The three Democratic candidates for councilman-at-large are Joseph E. Pozniak of 113 Amelia Dr., Fred Eckel of 38 Harding Ave. and Bernard R. Hay-

den of 133 Stonehenge Terr.

Councilman Pozniak is the chairman of the Governing Body's safety committee and the Council's representative to the Planning Board in addition to being a member of the negotiating, personnel and capital improvements committees and Council liaison to the ambulance squad.

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Dems have most Primary fights

In addition to selecting nominees for President, Senate Democrats and Republicans will also choose party representatives to run for United States senator, Congressional representative and freholder.

Three Democrats, former Vice President Walter Mondale, Colorado Sen. Gary Hart and The Rev. Jesse Jackson of Chicago, will be vying for their party's Presidential nod and delegates committed to each of the three plus one uncommitted state will be up for election.

Incumbent Republican President Ronald Reagan will be unopposed for his party's nomination, although GOP voters will select delegates to their party's convention also.

In the race for United States Senate Democratic incumbent, Bill Bradley of Denver, will face Elliot Greenspan of Hawthorn and Mary Mochary of Montclair will be facing Robert Morris of Mantoloking on the Republican side.

Sen. Bradley, 40, was elected to office in 1978 at the age of 35. He is a graduate of Princeton University, a former Rhodes Scholar, a former member of the United States Olympic Team and he led the New York Knicks to two National Basketball Assn. championships.

A graduate of Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, Mr. Greenspan is running on the slogan, "Citizen Democrat-Stop War and Depression."

Mrs. Mochary, a 41-year-old native of Hungary, was elected the first woman mayor of Montclair. She is an attorney.

Mr. Morris, also an attorney, has been counsel to three United States Senate committees, a civil court

judge, the president of two colleges, a commander in the Navy and a professor of geology in 10 countries around the world.

In the Sixth Congressional District, which includes Rahway, incumbent Democrat Bernard J. Dwyer of Edison will face President Walter Mondale of East Brunswick.

The Republican nominee, Dennis Adams of Edison, will have no Primary opposition.

Rep. Dwyer was first elected in 1980 and re-elected in 1982. He is New Jersey's only representative on the appropriations committee and is a member of the Northeast-Midwest Congressional Coalition and the Environmental and Energy Study Conference, the Congressional Caucus on Women's Issues and the Congressional Human Rights Caucus.

The representative served on the Edison Township Council from 1958 to 1970 and was the township's mayor from 1970 to 1974.

In Nov. 1973 he was elected to the State Senate from the 18th District and was re-elected in 1977—he was the Senate majority leader at the time of his election to Congress.

Mr. Picchocci resides at 30 Windsor Dr., East Brunswick.

Mr. Adams is an Air Force veteran and a resident of Edison since 1961. He is a former businessman who has divested himself of his holdings to seek election to Congress.

He resides at 16 Eileen Way, Edison.

The Republican incumbent in the Seventh Congressional District, which includes Clark, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo of Union, is unopposed for his party's nod.

Democrat, John F. Feeley of Roselle Park, Dwight Gatling of Plainfield and James J. Rinaldo of Brook, will square off for their party's nomination.

A native of Elizabeth, Rep. Rinaldo was first elected to Congress in 1972 from the 12th Congressional District, which includes Rahway, incumbent Democrat Bernard J. Dwyer of Edison will face President Walter Mondale of East Brunswick.

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The representative served on the Edison Township Council from 1958 to 1970 and was the township's mayor from 1970 to 1974.

He is presently the assistant chairman of the Democratic National Committee and a restaurant consultant, designer and manufacturer of food service equipment.

The incumbent, Mr. Green, is a member and former president of the Roselle/Linden Merchants Assn. He is on the Roselle Recreation Committee and the borough's Planning Board. On the freholder board he has served on the Criminal Justice Review Board and the Human Services Planning Advisory Council.

Mr. McGhee has been a resident of Hillside for 15 years. He received his bachelors degree from Jersey City State College and his masters degree from Seton Hall University. In his hometown he has been the chairman of the shade tree commission, a member of the mayor's advisory board, a member of the advisory council for the board of education and he has also been the chairman of the Coalition for a United Hillside.

Mr. Galko is a life-long resident of Hillside. He is the past chairman of the Hillside Democratic County Committee and is a retired engineer currently in the trucking business. He has also been a district leader for 22 years.

Myra Satterfield is the president of the Pierce Manor Tenants Assn. She has lived in Elizabeth for over 19 years and has a bachelor of science degree in mathematics from North Carolina Central University in Durham, N. C. She is employed as a computer programmer.

Mr. Ismail is the president of the Elizabeth Youth Council.

The second Democratic incumbent, Mr. Okrasinski, while on the freholder board has been a member of the Environmental Health Advisory Board, the Consumer Affairs Board and the Environmental Health Commission. He is an ironworker and a member of Local No. 480 of the International Assn. of Bridge, Structural and Ornamental Ironworkers.

A former Marine, he is active in many veterans groups.

The senior Republican member of the freholder board, Mr. Skomkowski is seeking his third term. He is a practicing trial attorney and currently serves as a councilman in Plainfield.

He is a 25-year resident of Linden.

Mr. Malgren was graduated from Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey in 1967 with a bachelor of arts degree. He served as a lieutenant on active duty with the Army for two years, most of it in Southeast Asia as a company commander.

Returning from overseas, he obtained his juris doctor degree from the University of Nebraska in 1971. He is a practicing trial attorney and currently serves as a councilman in Plainfield.

Mr. Gonor is serving his first term as Linden's City Council president. The first Republican elected at large to that office, he is a former member and president of the Linden Board of Education and serves as the Linden Kiwanis Club president.

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Board, township to discuss services exchange

The Clark Board of Education on May 22 formed a committee, comprised of Board president, Thomas Faria; Board member, F. Donald Paris, and Board secretary Phil Foster, to meet with the Township Council regarding an exchange of services between the two governing bodies.

Mayor Bernard Yarusavage made the proposal in a May 9 letter to the Board.

Possible exchanges might include the limiting of the township's school parking lots by the municipal engineering department in return for the Board's pruning grass at the Brewer School or the provision of a Black Seal Firm's licensed person for the repair and maintenance of Brewer's boilers.

Board member, John Dillon, termed the mayor's request an "interesting proposal."

He added, "The township does not have the money in its budget for these services."

Board member, Marie Sojka, saw the upcoming meeting as a way "to open communication."

In contrast, Board member, Thelma Parly, cited several instances where the Board extended itself to the township, noting the Board's intention of leasing the Brewer School to the township for \$1.

She said, "Someone's back is not being scratched."

Focusing on another piece of correspondence the

Board declined to decide on the re-naming of the Clark Babe Ruth Little League Baseball Field as the Jack Bostock Memorial Field.

Although noting the vast contribution to the youth of Clark made by the late Mr. Bostock, several Board members felt this instance was a poor precedent.

Some members pointed to the lack of guidelines for naming a field posthumously for someone in Clark.

The Board postponed a decision pending further investigation into a possibly more fitting tribute.

In other action the school body:

- Approved a five-year maintenance plan in accordance with the requirements of the Monitoring Manual for Public Schools.
- Changed the eighth-grade graduation date from Wednesday, June 20, to Thursday, June 21.
- Added Monday, June 25, to the 1983-1984 school calendar and changed June 21, to a full day and Friday, June 22, and Monday, June 25, to single-session days.
- Awarded a contract to the lowest bidder, Guardian Roofing Systems of West Caldwell, in the amount of \$122,172, to complete re-roofing of the Valley Road School.
- Awarded the disposal contract for the 1984-1985 school year to Errico Disposal, Inc. of Cranford for the total cost of \$14,859.36.
- Awarded the gasoline contract for the 1984-1985 school year to the Lincoln Fuel Co., Inc. of Middlesex.

- Awarded the fuel oil contract for the 1984-1985 school year to J. W. Pierson of East Orange.
- Retained the architectural firm of Musial and Guerra to develop the plans and specifications for macadam work at the Carl H. Kumpff and Frank K. Hehly Schools.
- Appointed Michael Dudek as an affirmative action Board representative in accordance with the requirements of the Monitoring Manual for Public Schools.
- Okayed the employment of Dr. Bertram Warren as the psychiatrist for the Clark public schools to be paid \$70 per hour work, but not to exceed \$4,000 for the 1984-1985 school year effective on Saturday, Sept. 1, 1984, to Sunday, June 30, 1985.
- Approved the employment of Mrs. Carol Spieker as a curriculum writer to work as part of a team of regional teachers. The team will translate the common computer curriculum outline into specific objectives and develop an eighth-grade test. Mrs. Spieker will work from Monday to Friday, July 9 to July 20, 1984, at a cost not to exceed \$300.
- Approved the cancellation of the scheduled caucus meeting of Tuesday, June 12, and approved it as a regular meeting.
- Approved on first reading a Board policy which would provide services to handicapped students between the ages of three and 21 years old.
