Fulcomer raps Marsh on mis-information

Once again I have an obligation to my constituents o speak out about mis-representation coming from Coun-ilman John C. Marsh and his publicity writer, Teri Malone, concerning my position on resource recovery. First of all, no councilman in Rahway has moved a esolution for an incinerator nor has the City Council voted for an incinerator. The City Council presently is studying and considering whether to accept or reject a smaller recovery facility than Councilman Marsh and the entire City Council voted to consider in 1981. Contrary to the Marsh Malone publicity, I am not joining their "bandwagon" on this matter because I shall

I never have been critical of Councilman Marsh's and I think our elected representatives should follow the relatively recent decision to speak out "in a negative fashion" on resource recovery. I welcome both negative and positive "fashions" in speaking on resource recovery because that is how the best final decision should be reached. Of what I have been critical and will continue to

THE NEW JERSEY REPORT Toxic substances need strong rules

During the past two and a half years New Jersey has emerged as a leader among the states in a variety of fields. Perhaps our strongest leadership role is in the area of enhazardous and toxic-waste cleanup. Our work with the critical dioxin situation in Newark has broken new

Among our outstanding environmental achievements is the New Jersey Worker and Community Right-To-Know Act, which I signed last Aug. 29, and which is now in the process of being implemented This landmark law, probably the best among the 14 states which have taken such action, ensures that those who work with hazardous substances and those who live in communities where these substatuces are used in industrial and manufacturing applications, will have access to information which will allow them to determine their

health and safety are protected.

The Worker and Community Right-To-Know Act The Worker and Community Right-To-Know Act engaged in mixing and applying the chemicals and fitthe hazardous substances used in the workplace to hose who work there and to those who live in the community. This information is particularly important to police and firemen who are often unknowingly exposed to toxic furnes when fighting chemical fires.

Additionally, the law also requires employers pro-

vide their workers with information concerning the short and long-term effects of exposure to these hazardous A strong Right-To-Know Law is particulary impor-tant in New Jersey, which leads the nation in the percen-

tage of workers employed in chemical manufacturing. About 17% of our manufacturing workers are employed in the chemical industry and this intensive chemical manufacturing activity takes place in the most densely populated state in the nation.
In New Jersey our Right-To-Know Law affects an estimated 1,300,000 workers and millions more who live in the communities which host these kinds of activities.

The law sets several strict requirements on hazardous substances present at their place of business. They must also maintain a file of basic safety information about thole substances. That information will come from try. The fuels the state conduction and training for their employes on how to handle those acres of taxpaying open

Further, the bill requires containers holding hazardous substances must be labeled within 18 months; all containers must be labeled within three years. Importanty, the labels must display the exact chemical names of the estances contained. All the information disclosed by the employer must

be available to employes at the workplace and to members of the community at the county health depart-ment. Local police and fire departments will also receive

our Right-To-Know Law is being jointly administered and enforced by the N. J. Departments of Health, Environmental Protection and Labor. Aiding the state will be a Right-To-Know Advisory Council, which is composed of 11 citizens who represent a broad range of proving interested in workplace and environmental safety. oups interested in workplace and environmental safety.

The advisory council will help State agencies ensure this important law is administered in a manner that pro-tects workers and community members and at the same time ensures employers will not be unnecessarily hampered in conducting their businesses. Unfortunately, while New Jersey was crafting high standards of safety for our residents, the United State Oc-cupational Safety and Health Administration in Wash-ington adopted a law which is not only weaker than ours, but there are to undernic our affection.

industry representatives say they could only agree with about 600 of those. We intend to continue our efforts to keep New Jersey's strong Right-To-Know in place. We have joined with the United Steel Workers and four other states (New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Wisconsin) seeking a review of the Occupational Safety and Heal Act regulation. Our Commissioners of Health and En-vironmental Protection have testified before Congress on

the importance of allowing the states to maintain their own, strict environmental workplace standards and we will continue this effort.

As Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Robert E. Hughey told the House Subcommittee on Health and Safety last month, "All we ask for is the best possible standards. We are not trying to create a hardship. Rather we are trying to prevent one. If states have the will and the talent to establish appropriate stan-dards, then those in federal office with mush greater resources and presumably broader and less parochial con-cerns, should do the same. In trying to protect the environment we should be aiming for the highest common denominator and not for an acceptable average. With the issues we face today, average is a step backward."


