Council okays Brewer asbestos inspection

After being read a letter from Township Engineer Edward Patalano which requested an inspection be made of the Charles H. Brewer School to determine if there was a potentially harmful amount of asbestos in the facility, which the township is leasing for municipal functions from the Board of Education, the Township Council Monday approved the spending of \$250 for the inspection.

According to Mayor Bernard G. Yarusavage the concern over Brewer was prompted by a seminar which had been attended by township officials at which state officials had said the inspection was needed.

Second Ward Councilman George Nucera asked how the Board of Education had not been aware of any potential hazard and had let classes being held in the buildings—by the Children's Specialized Hospital of Montanisside to be conducted in the facility after the state had issued its list of affected schools last month.

The mayor replied the township had been given no prior notification by the state and the inspection was just to double check it was no genuine indication of any hazard.

The resolution was set up to have the inspection made after the School Board is asked whether it has inspected all township school buildings itself.

A resident, William Kellerman of 78 King St. asked the Governing Body to appoint a bipartisan committee to investigate the operation of the township sub-code official's office because he said he was treated discourteously by sub-code official John Pabst, and refused permission to make photocopies of public documents.

According to Mr. Kellerman he had requested copies of documents relating to the construction of a home on property across the street from property he owns on Riverside Dr. and the sub-code official had told him he would not give him the copies and said, "get an attorney" if you want the documents.

The resident then went to Business Administrator Frank Varano and Township Attorney Joseph Triasi and was eventually given the documents, he said.

However, according to Mr. Patalano, who had also been mentioned by the Kellerman as refusing to give him the documents, the King St. resident was given

a copy of the site plan application, but it was his understanding it was against township policy to give out copies of site plans because these were confidential.

In other action, the Council authorized applications for New Jersey transportation Trust Fund Act money for improvements to Valley Rd., Terminal Ave., two sections of Broadview and Oak Ridge Rd.

Approved by William Maguire of 45 Terhune Rd., of preempting authority which rightfully belonged to the mayor, Councilman Joseph Pozniak said the Governing Body had a duty to pass a resolution, adopted Monday, to have township seek out all municipally owned cars but police cars.

Councilman Pozniak said he wanted to see the policy put into effect because the business administrator travels back and forth to his home in Morristown with a township automobile and he wanted that car marked as belonging to the township.

The councilmen also approved the introduction of three salary ordinances, with the salaries all to be retroactive to Jan. 1 of this year: One setting the salaries of the chief of police and the police captain at \$39,600 and \$33,000, respectively; one setting the salary of the assessor at \$28,000, and one setting the salary of an ad-

ministrative secretary at \$12,000 and that of a public works repairman at \$13,935.75.

Authorized the director of revenue and finance to refund a \$451.25 overpayment of real estate taxes to the New Brunswick Savings Bank of New Brunswick for property in Clark.

Approved a \$500 salary increment for Nancy Hart, a communications operator, to be effective on Wednesday, Oct. 24.

Reappointed William W. Ryan, Jr. of 73 Liberty St. as a constable for an additional three-year term. His term ended on Monday.

Awarded a one-year, \$1,635 contract to Motorola Communications and Electronics, Inc. of Glen Rock for radio maintenance for the department of public works.

Urged the adoption of an Assembly bill which would

require the state to provide all funds necessary to implement any new state-mandated programs.

Changed the executive session of the Governing Body for next month from Monday, Nov. 5, to Monday, Nov. 12, at 8 p.m.

Authorized the employment of Warren George, Inc. of Jersey City to do the soils and foundation investigation at the site of the proposed new fire station for \$1,178.

Retained the services of Thomas Vitolo to represent the township in a pending Civil Service appeal.

Awarded a bingo license to John L. Ruddy Post No. 7363 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and raffle licenses to the Ladies' Guild of Zion Lutheran Church and Temple Beth Or. All are Clark groups.

Hyatt-Clark gets \$2 million federal grant

The executive director of the Union County Economic Development Corp., Ralph Klopfer, announced Hyatt Clark Industries, the employee-owned roller bearing plant, formerly a division of General Motors, has received a \$2 million Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG) from the Dept. of

Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This was the second \$2 million UDAG awarded to Hyatt Clark by HUD.

The Union County Economic Development Corp. (UCEDC) was instrumental in obtaining these federal grants for Hyatt Clark.

Since the grants were provided to facilitate an employee takeover from General Motors, a moratorium on repayment of principal and interest will remain in place until 1989. At that time Hyatt Clark will begin repayments at an interest rate of 9 1/2 percent.

Quarterly principal and interest payments totaling \$57,000 will be made until the year 2010, at which time the remaining balance becomes due. The repayments go to Union County and UCEDC, the applicant for the UDAG loans on behalf of Hyatt Clark.

UCEDC is administering loan payouts as agent for the county and will administer Hyatt Clark's repayments.

Urban Development Action Grants, once awarded, are not repaid to HUD. The funds will be recycled by the county to provide low-cost, long-term financing for business projects and other community development programs, concluded Mr. Klopfer.

The funds are being used for equipment reclamation and the purchase of new equipment to produce tapered bearings for the automobile, farm, equipment and railroad industries, according to Mr. Klopfer.

Township to begin leaf collection

Clark Mayor Bernard G. Yarusavage announced leaf collection in the Township will start on Monday, Oct. 22, and run to Friday, Oct. 24.

The schedule for this year is as follows: Second and Third Wards, Oct. 22 to 26; First and Fourth Wards, Oct. 29 to Nov. 2; Second and Third Wards, Nov. 8 to 16; First and Fourth Wards, Nov. 19 to 20, and follow-up of all wards, Dec. 3 to 14.

Please note the chipping service will be discontinued as of Thursday, Oct. 18, during leaf collection and through the snow season. It will resume in February or March, of 1985. Please telephone the public works

department for emergency situations.

Pickup of bulky items will be discontinued until January, 1985. The last day for bulky-item pickup will be Friday, Oct. 19.

The compactor will be on winter schedule as of Friday, Oct. 26. The compactor will be open Saturdays only, between 1 a.m. and 4 p.m. Evening hours will end Oct. 11.

Edward A. Patalano, director of public works and engineering, stated this schedule is to better facilitate the manpower available to the public works department to encompass the extensive leaf program and to aid in proper maintenance of the snow removal equipment.

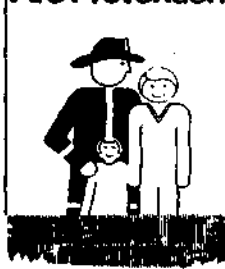
