## Regional Board uses \$260,000 from surplus

The Union County Regional High School District No. 1 Board of Education, which governs Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in Clark, Oct. 1 voted to transfer \$260,000 from current expense surplus to a variety of accounts in its 1985-1986 current expense budget so that it would not overexpend the tab.

The following accounts received funds:

- Course reimbursements \$10,000
- Transportation contracts \$40,000
- Maintenance contracts \$10,000
- Repairs to buildings to make them more accessible to the handicapped as required by the federal government \$10,000
- Property insurance \$5,000
- Medical insurance \$85,000
- Liability insurance \$45,000
- Special education tuitions \$20,000
- Student body activity deficits \$20,000

—Adult school salaries, including a payment to former director, Harold Linkin, for unused vacation days and 100 sick days \$55,000

—Summer school salaries \$7,000

—Summer school supplies \$3,000

The Board also accepted an emission control unit, donated by the New Jersey Motor Vehicle Division through the efforts of William Sangulino, a vocational advisory committee member, for the automobile shop at Johnson, at a cost of \$1.

Board members gave their permission for two English teachers at the Clark school, Mrs. Sharon Weiskopf and Mrs. Susan Dougherty, to participate in a special state department of education conference on "Computers and Writing Skills" at the Regional Curriculum Services Unit in East Brunswick on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 and 2.

School body approval was also given for Carmine Vitolo, a science instructor at the township school, and 40 of his students to visit the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. tomorrow.

A former custodian in the regional district, Michael Stojka, was authorized to be paid \$2,145.42 for 29 unused vacation days, and another former custodian, Francis Domaratus, will be paid \$175.46 for two unused vacation days thanks to Board approval.

Mrs. Katherine Zigmont, a member of the foreign language department at Johnson, will have her salary raised from \$33,600 to \$36,300, effective on June 1 of this year, and again, effective on Sept. 1 of this year, to \$38,300, for completing 30 credits beyond her masters degree.

The education body also gave a student from Clark permission to receive hospital instruction for approximately two months.

The Johnson student is hospitalized at the Elizabeth General Medical Center in Elizabeth. Tuition will be charged at \$15 per day for an estimated total of \$600.

### GOP trio raps salary increase

Union County Freeholder candidates G. Richard Malgren of Plainfield, William H. Eldridge of Berkeley Heights, and James J. Fulcomer of Rahway, today condemned the 43 percent salary increase for incumbent Democratic opponents gave themselves over a two-year period as "outrageous and excessive."

"This greedy salary grab of our opponents is just the sort of thing that makes many people lose confidence in government. I am proud our runningmate, Freeholder Chairman Malgren, never voted for a 43 percent increase," said Mr. Fulcomer, a three-term councilman.

Mr. Eldridge, a former mayor, said the freeholder salary increase was far higher than the increase given the hardworking, full-time county employees and creates an unhealthy double standard for county government.

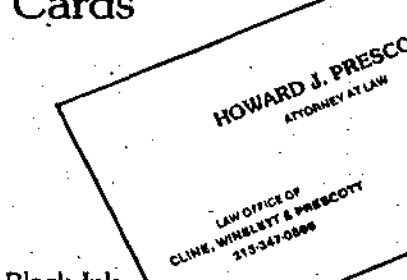
"How many taxpayers have gotten a 43 percent increase? The average salary increase for our opponents' 43 percent increase," declared Mr. Malgren, a former councilman.

"If all three Republican freeholder candidates are elected the people can be confident there will be no 43 percent salary increase after we take office in January," he added.

Mr. Eldridge said any future increase should be no more than the increase which the average county employee gets.

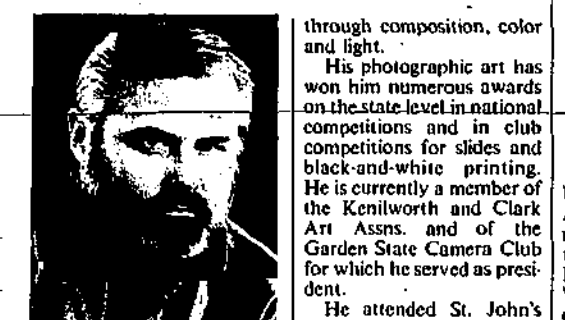
### NAACP to celebrate 51st anniversary at November banquet

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# Hurricane Gloria declared catastrophe

Hurricane Gloria has been declared a catastrophe as a result of the wind damage and flooding it caused. This number should be used on all claims resulting from the storm, reported Bob Avery, catastrophe chairman of the Independent Insurance Agents of New Jersey (IINJ).

"One of the most important people homeowners should contact after a major disaster such as Hurricane Gloria is their local independent insurance agent. The sooner they contact their agent, the sooner their claim will be processed," said Mr. Avery.

"Before calling, carefully survey the damage done to the home and develop a detailed list of that damage. Be patient and describe the damage to the insurance agent as accurately as possible to avoid confusion during the claim process," added Mr. Avery.

"Take immediate steps to protect undamaged parts of the house. Insurance policies don't cover damage due to neglect.

"Sort damaged items from undamaged ones and prepare a list that includes the value of the damaged items and the cost of replacing them in today's market. Take photos and save damaged items as proof to back up a claim.

"Obtain estimates from contractors on the cost of repairs.

"Claims take time to get going, so the earlier you make the adjuster's job, the faster you will be reimbursed. Typically, it takes two to three weeks for the claim process to start moving, but once it does, things usually move in an efficient manner," said Mr. Avery.

"In the case of a major disaster, claim adjusters may have to prioritize claims to service the most needy first. Allow two weeks after reporting a claim to hear from your adjuster. If you have not heard from him or her in that span of time, then make a follow-up call," added Mr. Avery.

Mr. Avery stressed that the most important precaution a homeowner can take prior to a disaster is to have the proper coverage. He outlined these guidelines:

- Flood and Homeowners Insurance. Homeowners should consult their local independent insurance agent.
- What would great-grandmother think if she came back and saw all these ready-repaved frozen meals.

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

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
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

## Third senior citizen complex completed

The Hansen & Johnson Development Team made history for senior citizens in Rahway, with the completion of the city's third senior citizen complex.

The Walter Schaffhauser Towers, a 40-unit facility, occupies the former site of an 86-year old elementary school. The school, in existence from 1897 to 1983, was demolished to make way for the 36,520 square-foot senior citizen complex.

Many of the same people who attended Washington School will spend their golden years in the same location, according to Rahway Mayor Daniel Martin. The Mayor expressed that there was more history in the making by providing the city's senior citizens with an aesthetic and comfortable new address, than with preserving the original building, which was not really usable. The cornerstone from Washington School was incorporated in a monument marking the site.

The five-story brick building, located on the corner of Lawrence Street and East Grand Avenue, was recently dedicated by The Hansen & Johnson Development Team of Rochelle Park and the City of Rahway Housing Authority. The Hansen & Johnson Development Company, comprised of Lloyd Rosenberg, AIA, Arnold Reiter, Esq., and George John, AIA, has developed similar turnkey projects throughout New Jersey and New York City, including a 100-unit midrise apartment building for the Bergen County Housing Authority.

The Walter Schaffhauser Towers is next door to the Rahway Geriatric Center, the only city-backed nursing home in New Jersey. The two buildings are connected by a walkway, for the convenience of many of the Towers residents who have relatives in the nursing home. The Hansen & Johnson Partnership, architects for the building, designed a courtyard area for the Towers, with picnic tables and park benches. Private, off-street parking is available.

The Hansen & Johnson Development Team unveiled a 45-inch color television set at the ceremonies as a gift for the new residents.

Rahway has three senior citizen projects, with 40 new units under construction at 337 West Milton Avenue.

"With a city of Rahway's small size - approximately 27,000 people - it is fairly unusual to have 361 units of senior citizen housing," said John McGrath, executive director of the Rahway Housing Authority.

The city's first senior complex, with 85 units, was built in two phases, in 1964 and 1968, at 224-250 West Grand Avenue. Its largest complex has 196 units at 200 East Milton Avenue.

The Walter Schaffhauser Towers, the newest complex, was named after the Housing Authority's former executive director, who was responsible for funding the building. Total development cost was \$2,200,000.

Other projects by The Hansen & Johnson Development Company include a dual family/senior citizen project for 189 units in the Bronx. The firm is completing this two-part project for the New York City Housing Authority, at an \$11.3 million total development cost. The development will offer 72 low-rise units for families at Third Avenue and 171st Street of Claremont Parkway, and 116 senior citizen units in a seven-story building at Franklin Township.

The Hansen & Johnson Development Company is also working on a 200-unit New York City Housing Authority project on Avenue C on the Lower East Side of Manhattan. This project for family possession is a \$14.2 million total development.
