Voters OK school budget; incumbents, Linken win

About 17 percent of the township's approximate 11,000 voters, 1,755, turned out for Tuesday's Board of Education Elections.

The three available Board of Education seats went to two incumbents, F. Donald Paris and Thelma Purdy, and to newcomer Dennis C. Linken. They defeated incumbent James E. Kehoe and candidates George R. Cisneros and John Schroeck for the three-year terms.

By a narrow mergin of 122 votes. Clark voters approved the 1986-87 elementary school budget which includes a Current Expense portion of \$6,304,326 and Capital Outlay of \$147,500. This means an average tax increase of \$3.73 per month for Clark's homeowners.


