### Caruso is vote leader

## Voters approve referendum for fire sub-station

Clark residents approved referendum for a new fire sub-station in a vote of 2,414 in favor to 1,562 opposed and the only incumbent in the race for Municipal Council member garnered the most votes in l'uesday's election.

Democratic incumbent Second Ward Councilman William D. Caruso totalled 855 votes to his Republican opponent Ralph S. Whittle, Ir.'s total of 440 votes.

First Ward Democrat Councilman Raymond Krov left his seat open to Democrat-Robert Ellenport with a total of 589 votes compared to Republican John J. Dillon's total of 493

Third Ward Republican Councilwoman Ruth De-Luca, in deciding not to runfor re-election, saw her seat won by another woman, Republican Carol Pluta, who garnered 733 votes in opposition to Democrat Joseph A. Comarata.

Fourth Ward Republican Councilman Brian Toal left his seat vacant for Republican Carmine F. Cristiani who totalled 528 votes over his Democratic opponent Ronald Kennedy who garnered 518 votes.
