The remaining members of the council verified an amount of \$22,890 owed to the township by the Swimming Pool Utility, added ad-ditional monies of \$80,000 from the sale of surplus land into the budget and reduced the budgeted insurance

Corrections totalling \$40,000 were also made by the township clerk and business administrator. Anticipated savings from these four areas totalled \$275,000.

Councilwoman Carol Pluta said she and Hayden and Cristiani walked out

One area of contention was salary increases for council members. Pluta said that raises of \$1,600 per year were approved to be included in the budget, bringing salaries of council members up to \$3600 per year. "We vouldn't go for, it," said


secondary school students. Nominated teachers are judged according to the effectiveness and impact of their work, particularly as it
