Regional budget going to polls

by Pat DiMaggio The Union County Regional Roard of Education which governs policy at Ar thur L. Johnson High School in Clark, is asking to support their 1987-88 budget when they go to the polls on April 7.

CLARK, NEW JERSEY, THURSDAY, APRIL 2, 1986

The budget, which totals \$22,096,394, includes funding for all-four Regional High Schools including Johnson, David Brearley in Kenilworth, Jonathan Dayton in Springfield and Governor Livingston in Berkeley Heights.
"The board has agreed to

budget with a modest increase of 5.82 percent after carefully considering the many needs of the students in the six communities as vell as the burden any budget might place upon taxpayers," said Superinten-

dent of Schools Dr. Donald Merachnik, "Although the task of budget development was not an easy one, it was carried out with professional planning and pruning and with sensitivity to the most pressing priorities of our student body. Approval at the polls on April 7 will ensure a continuation of quality education plus varied opportunities for individual student growth via many activities and pro-

Merachnik said many line item accounts would be frozen at the same dollar staff positions would be cut in accordance with the enrollment decline throughout the four schools and there would be no capital outlay portion of the budget.
"Aside from anticipated increases in staff salaries and fringe benefits and the purchase of some additional textbooks, library books and workbooks, the major budgetary change will be found in increased costs for insurance premiums," said Merachnik

Included in the budget for Arthur L. Johnson High School, numbering 699 students, is funding repair of the thirty year old stage floor and funds to upgrade safety standards and Physical conditions within the art room.
