Jodi Danis awarded two scholarships

Jodi B. Danis of Acorn Drive, Clark, has been named a winner of two scholarships made available through Schering-Plough Corporation, an international manufacturer of health and personal care products.

She is the recipient of a scholarship awarded by the Dr. William M. Scholl Worldwide Scholarship Program, as well as a Schering-Plough Merit scholarship.

The Scholl scholarship provides \$4,500 per year,

and the Schering-Plough Merit scholarship ranges between \$1,000 and \$2,500 per year. Both scholarships are available to the children of Schering-Plough employees.

Some 132 students competed for the Scholl scholarships, and 30 winners were chosen by the College Scholarship Service of Princeton, on the basis of academic achievement, leadership qualities, extracurricular activities and community service. The

scholarships are sponsored by the Dr. Scholl Foundation. Scholl, Inc., a subsidiary of Schering-Plough, was founded by Dr. William M. Scholl, who was the original donor of the Foundation.

The Schering-Plough Merit scholarships drew 97 applicants, of whom 10 were selected by the independent, non-profit National Merit Scholarship Corporation on the basis of scores achieved on the Scholastic Aptitude Test for

college admissions. Also evaluated were the students' scholastic achievement, leadership qualities and community service.

Jodi is the daughter of Leslie Danis, senior systems engineer/information services for Schering-Plough Corporation. Jodi is graduating from the Pingry School in Martinsville, as valedictorian of her class. She will attend the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia.

Propane safety

Propane tanks for outdoor gas grills and recreational vehicles should be handled carefully, according to a spokesman from the Clark Bureau of Fire Prevention.

Never carry or store propane tanks in the trunk of your car or inside your recreational vehicle, garage basement or work area. You should store your tank outside in a shaded area. Before using your grill you should check all hoses and fittings to make sure they are on properly. Avoid grease build up in your propane grill.

By following these fire safety tips, you should enjoy the use of your grill longer and safer this season.

Rinaldo's mobile office on the road Saturday

For the 15th consecutive year, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, R-N.J., will hit the road Saturday with his mobile office to assist constituents with federally-related problems.

"Since taking office in 1973, I have met with thousands of district residents who needed help or just wanted to talk about legislation before Congress," Rinaldo said. "The mobile office brings

government virtually to their doorsteps and helps them avoid the bureaucratic red tape they so often encounter in dealing directly with a federal agency."

Rinaldo said the mobile office will make one-hour stops beginning at 9 a.m. in five municipalities in Union County.

The tour begins with a stop in Elizabeth at the intersection of Broad and East Jersey Streets. The se-

cond stop will be at the Pathmark Shopping Center on South Avenue, Garwood, where the mobile office will be located from 10:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. to serve constituents in Cranford and Garwood.

From Garwood, Rinaldo will travel to Bradlees Shopping Center on Central Avenue in Clark for a stop from 11:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. The last two stops will be at the intersection of Broad and Elm Streets in Westfield from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. and Five Points in Union from 3 to 4 p.m. The Westfield stop is intended to serve residents of Westfield and Mountainside, while the Union stop will serve residents of Union, Roselle Park and Kenilworth.

Rinaldo said caseworkers from his office specializing in Social Security, veterans affairs, immigration, military problems, college student loans, and federal grants will be available to help constituents with problems involving the federal government. He said persons seeking assistance should bring all correspondence and records pertinent to the matter they want to discuss. The Congressman said no appointment is needed and constituents are welcome to visit the mobile office site most convenient for them. A second mobile office tour covering the remaining portion of the congressional district is being planned for a later date.
