UCC President's List

Twenty-two Rahway and Clark residents are among 211 full-time and part-time students named to the President's List at Union County College for the Spring Semester, it is announced by Dr. Derek N. Nunney of Summit, UCC president.

The President's List recognizes students who have achieved a minimum of a 3.5 cumulative average based on a 4.0 scale, Dr. Nunney said.

Union County College, the public comprehensive community college of Union County, enrolls 8,000 students, 3,500 full-time and 4,500 part-time, at campuses in Cranford, Elizabeth, Plainfield and Scotch Plains, and at various off-campus sites. The College offers transfer programs with 34 options in liberal arts, biology, business, criminal justice, engineering, and physical

science, which lead to an Associate in Arts degree. Courses in these programs parallel freshman and sophomore offerings at four-year colleges and universities and graduates are eligible to transfer to these institutions with advanced standing. About 80 percent of the graduates of these programs transfer with junior year standing to 500 colleges and universities in all 50 states.

The College also conducts cooperative programs in professional nursing and radiography with Elizabeth General Medical Center, Elizabeth and Muhlenberg Regional Medical Center, Plainfield, which lead to an Associate in Science degree conferred by the College and a diploma awarded by the Schools of Nursing and Radiography.

"Roxanne"

"Roxanne" is a lovely comedy/romance film starring Steve Martin and Daryl Hannah. A pleasant surprise of this modern day adaptation of Rosalind's 16th Century Play, "Cyrano De Bergerac" is that it does not rely on car chases, filthy language or scantily clad women to bring out its comic roars. Rather, it is a comedy involving fresh perspectives on timeless comic and romantic situations, such as mistaken identity and unrequited love.

The film tells the hilarious yet woe-filled tale of small town, resort area Fire Chief C.D. Bales (Martin) whose dash and wit cannot overshadow the tremendous size of his nose. The poor guy is bested upon all types of bullies, though he handles all comers with a great deal of panache. When a beautiful astronomer (Hannah) comes to town, C.D. naturally falls head over nose, et al. in love with her. But her eyes are only on C.D.'s assistant, a handsome hunk named Chris (Rick Rossovich). Chris, for all of his physical attributes, simply cannot transfer himself to a woman, so he goes to the romantic and heart-broken C.D. The hopeless, still smitten romantic decides to help the lumbering fool because if he cannot have the beautiful Roxanne, then at least his words and inner feelings will possess her.

Rick Rossovich adds just the right touch of brains over brains as Chris, whose biopic are profusely digested then his vocabulary. An informative twenty-minute film, not usually shown during regular tours, covered the casting of a mold from clay to the final finished porcelain detailing the numerous processes required for every piece. In his intense dedication to produce only an authentic finished product, Mr. Boehm was pictured in the film studying a live bird, which he held in his hand.


