Union County municipalities prepare to meet August 1 recycling deadline

At the request of the Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA), muni cipal officials are reviewing plans for complying with an administrative order that prohibits the disposal of recyclables at Edgeboro landfill, beginning August

The order was issued to Union, Middlesex, Somerset and Morris counties by the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the Board of Public Utilities (BPU) on

It accompanied a ruling allowing the East Brunswick landfill to remain open to Union, Somerset and Morris counties until January 1, when those counties will begin shipping garbage to out-of state land-

Guidelines issued by the DEP indicate that residents commercial businesses and institutions within the four counties must recycle the following materials:

• Residenes - news paper, glass, aluminum cans certain yard wastes, such as leaves.

* Commercial Businesses clean corrugated and clean cardboard (non-food containers) and office paper, such as computer printouts, tabular cards and vhite ledger paper.

UCUA officials say the DEP order will be strictly enforced. The state has adviced County officials that haulers who attempt dump recyclable materials at Edgeboro will be turned away, thereby interrupting municipal waste collection.

A proposal to convert a Roselle warehouse into a recycling center is being opposed by some officials there, who have adopted an ordinance banning the storage of recyclable materials from other towns. The Authority has filed suit against

In order to meet the August I ban on recyclables at Edgeboro, municipalities throughout the four coun ties are required to designate a recycling coor-dinator, establish or expand depots and curbside pick ups for recyclables, and implement educational pro-

According to Union County Recycling Coordinator Joan Buhrendorf, the UCUA is required to coordinate the recycling element of the order, while municipalities are responsible for implementation.

tesidential recycling as well as those mandated for commercial businesses and institutions. Municipalities are also urged to augment present recycling programs by increasing manpower and extending current hours of operation," she said.

To comply with the ban on landfilling leaves, leaf composting facilities must be established by the fall leaf season. Homeowners are also urged to allow grass clippings to remain on their lawns and cut grass higher and more frequently.

The municipalities to amend clippings actually help to

improve the soil."

In summer, Nichnadowicz added, lawns should be about 21/2 inches high, because it cuts down on evaporation and acts like an umbrella. "When lawns are out short in summer, crabgrass seeds laying on the surface are exposed to more sunlight and are given the opportunity to flourish, he explained.

If clippings are bagged, residents are advised to allow the material to dry before using it as mulch.
