### Recycling vote clarified

Curbside collection of recyclable materials will begin in Clark on September 1 according to a plan instituted by Mayor George Nucera and Business Administrator Joseph Monaco.

Residents were previously asked to bring their newspapers, glass and aluminum to the township's Disposal and Recycling Center, but after several calls of protest from

residents the curbside plan was formulated, said Monaco. "We felt it was the thing to do, we should provide for the people," said Monaco. "The mayor and I discussed it and decided it is a service the town should provide."

The Township Council approved emergency funding and the hiring of two more employees in the Public Works Department to begin the collection by a telephone vote. Councilwoman Carol Pluta said that when she received a call she suggested the council sit down and discuss it. Previous reports that she and Councilman Bernard Hayden voted against the collection were incorrect, she said. "How can you say yes or no by a telephone call," she asked. "We did not vote against curbside collection, we didn't vote either way. We requested a meeting to sit down and discuss it. I am against the additional \$40,000 this will cost the taxpayers. Why can't we put the materials out with the regular garbage pick up?"

Residents are asked to place rinsed glass and aluminum cans in hard plastic or metal receptacles and tie newspapers with strong cord in bundles not to exceed 12 inches in height. Plastic bags may not be used. Large pieces of cardboard such as appliance boxes should also be tied with strong cord.

Household cardboard items such as food containers and cereal boxes and plastic bottles and containers may be put into the regular trash.

The recycling pick-up schedule will run for six months, from September 1 through February 29.
