Aragona designated "outstanding teacher"

For many students, the prospect of going to a chemistry class can be very frightening.

Mr. John Aragona, a teacher of chemistry at the Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in Clark, is well aware of the "fear" that some students have when it comes to subjects such as chemistry. But he's not offended by the perceptions of these students — instead, he acknowledges and understands them, making every effort to quell the anxieties of the youngsters through his teaching style.

Aragona, a member of the Science Department at Johnson Regional since September, 1989, has been designated as the school's "Outstanding Teacher" in conjunction with Governor Thomas Kean's Teacher Recognition Program. This honor is based upon his "use of effective instructional techniques and methods" as well as his "development of feelings of self-worth and esteem of learning" in his students during the 1986-87 school year.

As the "Outstanding Teacher" from Johnson Regional, Mr. Aragona will receive a certificate of commendation from Governor Kean and will participate in the Governor's Convocation on Excellence in Teaching during the spring.

In addition, the Union County Regional High School District will be provided with a \$1,000 grant in Aragona's name, which can be used only for an educational purpose as designated by the honored teacher.

"I like to think of my approach to teaching as something which can be termed 'humanistic,'" explained Aragona. "You can't stand in the front of a classroom and spew out facts like a computer. Many students enter a chemistry class intimidated by the teacher and by the subject matter they will have to learn. As a teacher, I have to eliminate that intimidation factor and attempt to make the students in my classes as comfortable as possible."

"Teaching here at Johnson has been a great experience," said Aragona. "We have an outstanding environment for teaching and learning in this school — a great administration, faculty and student body, an atmosphere of discipline and fine facilities. And, after 19 years here, I still get a charge out of teaching!"

The Regional Board of Education approved trips at their regular meeting held last week for students at Arthur L. Johnson High School.

Students will attend the Columbia University Scholastic Press Conference to be held March 16 to 18. The spring conference is devoted to newspapers. Anticipated costs are \$26 per student and \$1,125 for rental of a bus for transportation to and from New York City.
