Despite the fact that at the opening of the polls yesterday afternoon it was estimated that less than half of the voters of the city had registered, the final figures showed that the registration was only ninety-three less than the vote cast in this city last year. The registration at the close of the polls last night was 1877. The vote at the last general election was 1970. This year's registration is considerably below that of last year's which was 2426. It is believed that a larger percentage of registration will vote, however, under the new German law.

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## TO LECTURE ON TURKEY

Rev. Wm. T. Stuchell Will Talk on the "Heart of the Turkish Empire"
