In all our study of this question of transportation we continually blind ourselves to the true condition of affairs by taking cognizance only of that body of freight which now moves and figuring what a given reduction of freights would amount to on such a body of moving freight, wholly ignoring the larger volume which would move were rates of transportation from point of production to point of first shipment cut in half, as they could be cut in half were the country systematically developed along the lines of good roads and good waterways.


