CHRISTMAS RUSH ON AT BANK, EXPRESS AND POST OFFICE

Time of Business Greater Than in Former Years—According to Various Authorities—Much Extra Work

EMPLOY ADDITIONAL CLERKS

Lines of "Hard Times" Rushed by Increased Holiday Trade in this City—Forecasting Prosperity

The last hour Christmas rush made itself felt strongly today at the Post Office, the bank, and the express office, and the employees of these institutions have kept on the jump all day, serving the thousands of customers which they can be called—who had packages to send, money orders to fill, registered letters to ship to friends, and money to draw from the bank.

At the Post Office there was a continuous line all day and the amount of business transacted bids fair to be a record for this time of year.

The money order division felt the rush to the greatest extent known since it was instituted here. In spite of the crisis of hard times, it is estimated that more money has been transacted and received in this manner from this office at this time than at any other time in the history of the office.

In spite of the great rush, there was no confusion in the handling of the business and the regular force, supplemented by two extra men, called for by the business with dispatch and willingness. Many remarks were heard concerning the courtesy and efficient service of the employees. No complaints were heard today.

It is believed that the total business of all departments will be greater than in any previous year.

In several instances mail to be sent was brought in before 8 o'clock and deposited and made ready for quick sorting by the post office clerks, while a large package full of Christmas gifts, which the regular mail division was carrying, was also brought in before 8 o'clock.

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EMPLOYEES GRANTED DIVIDEND

Three-In-One Company Gives Six Per Cent Year's Salary to Workmen.

Following a custom which has been in vogue at the works of the Three-In-One Oil Company of this city for the past six years, President J. Noah N. Sile, with the Board of Directors of the company, met yesterday afternoon and declared a dividend of six per cent of the annual salary to be paid to each employee of the company. Each year the company, which is conducted on the co-operative plan, declares a dividend for the benefit of the employees of six per cent of their salary for the year, and the results have been well justified.

Vice-President Stewart yesterday made the address to the employees and announced which they have been performing. He congratulated them on their work and spoke for the advance of the company. A response was made by the superintendent of the company, who thanked the president, vice-president and board of directors in behalf of the employees for their annual gift.

The factory is running on full time and the co-operative plan has met with a great deal of success since it was originated here.

Regular routine business occupied the rest of the meeting of the board.

Many interested in aviation problems are awaiting with interest the outcome of the trial flight of the new machine, as its design and construction embody several new features which, if proven practical, will mark a distinct advance in aerial navigation mechanism.
