

NEED MONEY TO SAVE MONARCHY

Chinese Premier Faces Financial Crisis.

FEAR REIGN OF ANARCHY.

Most important question before Imperial Cabinet is payment of local provincial authorities. Permission of Great Britain would obtain loans from British banks.

Peking, Dec. 25.—After personal interviews with cabinet officials, which disclose the gravity of the situation, it is clear that unless the British minister yields and permits the willing loans to support financially Yuan Shih Kai, the Chinese monarchy will fall.

The most important question before Yuan's cabinet is obtaining funds to defray the government's ordinary expenses, especially the payment of local provincial authorities and Manchuria's share of the railway interest.

Four provinces have already petitioned for this. Yuan Shih Kai's greatest anxiety is that the soldiers of the north may resort to pillage and brigandage, resulting in anarchy, chaos, anarchy and possible massacre of those who remain.

Yuan's personal popularity is holding the elements orderly and insuring tranquility. The government within Peking must be maintained under the old system until the solution of the financial crisis. Otherwise trouble is possible with the provinces, and the government foreign intervention and a general upheaval.

About \$10,000,000 monthly is essential to enable Yuan Shih Kai to preserve peace, and he is recommending the same government to accept this, according to the agreement with the four banking groups, which participate equally in the loan. China cannot act independently. Her hands are tied. Individually, all the groups advocate small loans.

ATTEMPTS TO SLAY MAN WHO PREVENTS COWARDLY ASSAULT

Nick Seracino Draws Revolver and
Tries to Shoot George C. Rainier
Who Intervenes in Street Fight

IS HELD FOR GRAND JURY

Hammer of Gun Falls On Only Ex-
posed Cartridge as Infiltrated Italian
Seeks to Kill Stranger

Charged with felonious assault, Nick Seracino, 35, of 129 Main Street, was yesterday held in \$1,000 bail for the Grand Jury by Judge Book.

The case will be heard in Elizabeth at the January sitting.
