

President of Chinese Republic Issues Manifesto.

Shanghai, Jan. 6. Dr. Sun Yat Sen, provisional president of the Chinese republic, issued a friendly manifesto to all friendly nations growing out of the revolution in China.

The manifesto is in Chinese and the Chinese against the Manchus, which it says, the Chinese have borne for 200 years with patience and forbearance. It will reward the brave, will punish the traitors, will trade restrictions. It will insure religious toleration and cultivate better relations with foreign nations."

HEALTH BOARD WILL OBVIATE NUISANCE IN MANCUSO'S YARD

Former Open Sewer to be Filled in With Fresh Dirt and Ashes

Free Eros Refuse

CONDITIONS NOT UNSANITARY

Investigation by Health Officers and President of Board Discloses No Exceptionally Dangerous Violations

"Nothing that is detrimental in any way to the health and sanitary condition of the city of Rahway will be allowed by the Board of Health," said Joseph Smith, president of the board, this morning. The alleged nuisance of dumping refuse and decaying matter in Mancuso's lane will be stopped as soon as it is found that the warmer weather will cause any trouble.

A complaint was made by Edward Cook, of Haydock Street, that Joseph Mancuso, contrary to a city ordinance, had been depositing refuse and garbage mixed with ashes in the lane near Haydock Street, and that as soon as warm weather and rain came, his property would be flooded with the decaying matter. He declared that he would take the matter before the State Board of Health as he did not seem to be able to get any satisfaction from the city.

An investigation has been made by Mr. Smith with the result that it was found that at present there was no cause for complaint. The refuse was in all probability Mancuso's had been dumping vegetable matter and garbage in the lane, but that as it would freeze in the winter, and as the Board of Health would see to it that no more of this sort of refuse would be dumped there after the warm weather commenced, and that all that refuse would be covered with clean dirt and ashes, there was no further cause for complaint.

For many years the place which is being filled up with ashes and other refuse, according to the city ordinance, was an open sewer and when the matter of closing it came before the residents of that section, not one of them would have been willing to have a sewer and have the open ditch filled in. Later the State Legislature passed a law empowering local boards of health to determine if a sewer should be built and to suggest to the common council that a sewer be built. If the council saw fit to pass such an ordinance, the sewer could be built in the place of the open ditch. In this case, this was done over a year ago and while the work has been held up once or twice on account of the engineering company with some regulations of the State Board of Health, the sewer has been built and over fifty per cent of the residents of that section have been connected with it.

When the sewer was built, it was necessary to fill in the ditch which had been an open sewer for some time and this has been done by filling it with refuse. The residents claim the ordinance in regard to dumping refuse has been violated and Mr. Cook has threatened to take the matter before the State Board of Health. Smith, the president of the State Board, will in turn refer it back to the local board.

But, according to Mr. Smith, there will be no cause for complaint. The matter will be tended to. He said this morning that as soon as there was the slightest indication of warmer weather, the practice, which, "unwisely obtained," said Mr. Smith, "of dumping refuse, of dumping the garbage from kitchens in the lane, would be stopped and the place covered with fresh, clean earth and ashes, thus obviating any possibility of nuisance."

He further stated that while there were undoubtedly some traces of refuse in the ash, they were hard to find and had to be dug out with a shovel. He said that the refuse piles now, being above the street level, Mr. Smith said that they might be in one or two places, but that the warmer weather would cause any trouble.

The meeting was especially planned for industrial workers, many taking advantage of the opportunity to hear Mr. Ranney also spoke on the subject of the members of Trinity M. E. Church, who heard Mr. Ranney, to form a party some evening and meet him in New York to visit some of the places described in his address.

FATHER AND SON NEAR DEATH

Insane Serious Injuries in Fire at Their Home in Kenilworth.

Rev. David H. Arthur, an evangelist, and his four year old son are in the General Hospital in Elizabeth today, suffering from serious injuries incurred when a fire occurred in their home in New Orange Park, Kenilworth, on Saturday night.

So seriously were both father and son burned that the recovery is in grave doubt. How the fire started is not known, but it is supposed that the boy was playing with kerosene from the furnace in the cellar and that his clothes caught fire.

He was in the cellar alone at the time and when he caught fire his screams were heard by his father, who rushed to his aid and tried to put out the fire. He was found in the cellar and his father picked him up and started for the stairs.
