





# BAND PLAYS AS SINKING LINER TAKES 1,400 DOWN TO DEATH

Officer Shoots Down Frantic Men. THEN KILLS HIMSELF.

Titanic's Survivors Tell Thrilling Stories.

EIGHT DIE DURING RESCUE.

Total Number of Saved Between 700 and 745.

The Titanic slid on to the narrow ledge of an iceberg, hung there for a brief moment and fell back into the water. Her three masts and funnels and she began to sink.

The band on board the Titanic went down playing "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

Mrs. Isidor Straus was partly dragged into a lifeboat. She refused to leave her husband to die alone, cried back to him and died in his arms, a tragic heroine of the sea.

Henry B. Harris was placed in a life boat, saw a woman and child who must have died, left his place and rushed them into the boat and then went down to his death.

Colonel John Jacob Astor refused to accept a life belt, helped a dozen women and children into lifeboats, refused to get into one himself and was seen to die.

Two lifeboats were lowered almost on end and capsized as soon as they struck the water, survivors assert. All of the women and children who had been placed in them slid into the water and were drowned.

Officers of the Titanic held drawn guns to keep back panic-stricken men while the women and children were being placed in the lifeboats.

The first thing that J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the steamship company that owned the Titanic, said when he was taken on board the Carpathia from a lifeboat was:

"For God's sake give me something to eat."

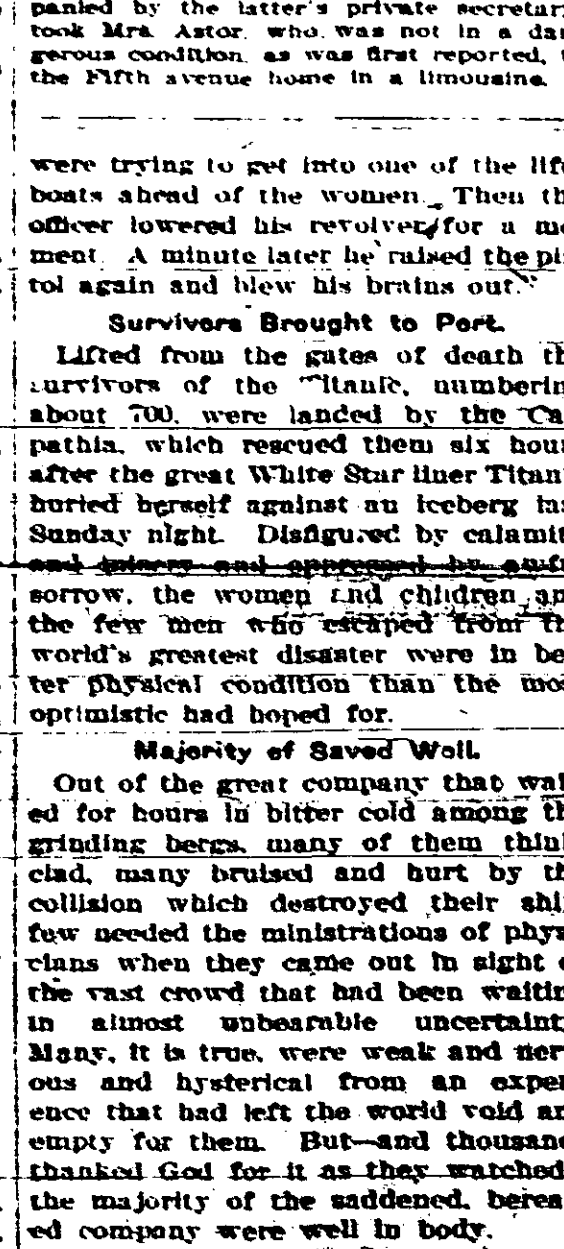
Mr. Ismay declared that he was the last man who entered the last boat that was taken away from the sinking Titanic. He also asserted positively that there was no use of firearms.

Three Boilers Blow Up After Crash. MANY MEN ARE HEROES

Captain Goes Down on Bridge of Vessel.

ASTOR MEETS DEATH CALMLY.

Mrs. Straus, Refusing to Leave Husband, Dies With Him.

Statement from the Titanic's passengers says there were 745 rescued out of a passenger list of 2,340.

The list of names rescued by the Carpathia on her arrival show 188 first class passengers, 113 in the second cabin, 178 third class and 261 of the crew, a total of 639 names.

A woman passenger on the Carpathia board from the ship's doctor that 408 of the passengers and 210 of the crew had been saved and that thirty-nine women lost their husbands. Six of these were ladies.

J. A. Bristow of Los Angeles was one of those who jumped from the Titanic after the last life. He was about fifty feet from the bow, swimming on his back, with his face turned toward the ill-fated ship. He said he saw a light and then rose up in the air. Then came a third boiler explosion. The ship buckled and sank.

He said there was not enough action to draw him back, but a wave came from the vessel and pitched him forward and away from the ship.

"I was walking on the deck, and it was a fine, cold, clear night. The moon was shining, and a number of us were enjoying the crisp, keen air, remarking about the deck."

Berg Close When Sighted. "Captain Smith was on the bridge when the first cry from the lookout came to him that there was an iceberg ahead. It may have been 300 feet high when I saw it, and it was probably 200 yards away from us, but I do not know. One in the water there were buoyed up by the life belts until they could get to the boats."

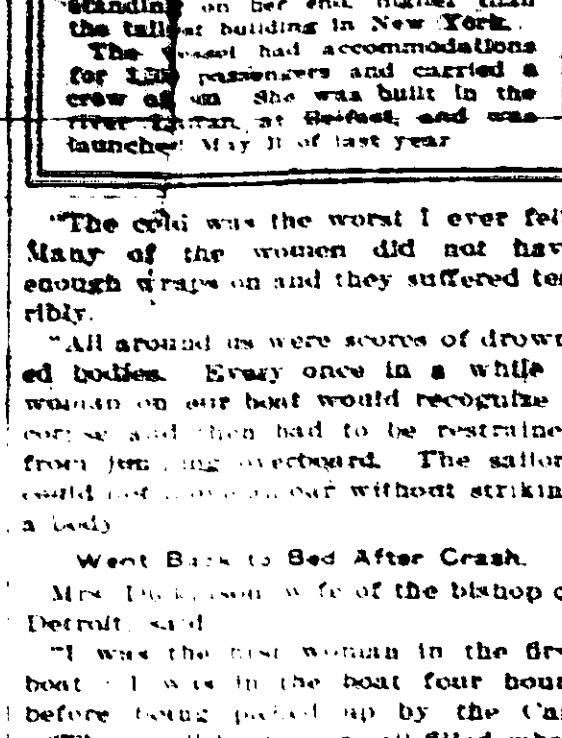
Eight Died During Rescue. It did not take long for the Carpathia to pick up the survivors. There were sixteen of the Titanic's boats about which the Carpathia got up. Two which carried the pursuer, the doctor and other officers of the White Star line, had capsized. Four of the Titanic's passengers died just as help came to them. Two died as they were being helped over the side and two others just as they were taken aboard.

Of these two were sailors, one a passenger and the other a steward. It was said that most of the men passengers of the Titanic who were brought here jumped from the sinking ship and were bailed into the lifeboats. One in the water there were buoyed up by the life belts until they could get to the boats."

Mrs. Astor Well. There were three automobiles to meet Mrs. Astor. Mr. Dobbin, the colonel's secretary, was on the pier all evening. Mrs. Astor was taken to the Astor's house at 840 Fifth avenue.

\$5,000 For Needy Survivors. Among the first to arrive was a committee from the Stock Exchange headed by R. L. Thomas. Mr. Thomas had a long black box, which contained \$5,000 in small bills, which was to be handed out to the needy survivors.

The Waldorf-Astoria had sent over eight limousine cars to convey to the hotel a number of survivors.

CONGRESSMEN AT PIER. Carried Subpoenas For Inquiry and Others in Appear at Investigation.

New York, April 10.—The subcommittee of the senate committee on commerce arrived at the Congressional Limited at 9:07 p. m. from Washington. They were met at the station by Deputy Collector Stewart. The entire party immediately took taxis to the Carpathia pier.

Senator William Alden Smith of Michigan headed the party, in which were Senators Nevins and Nevada, and Senators Newlands, Deane, Sargent and Ames. The two had subpoenas, which they intended to use.

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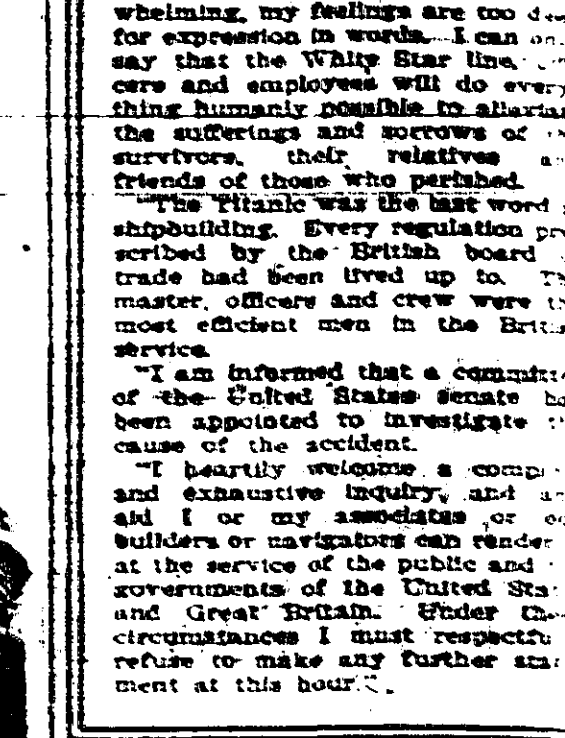

United States Senator Briggs, Westchester, offered on Tuesday night to the Rivers and Harbors Bill, appropriating money for a survey of the Rahway river. This can be regarded as a preliminary move looking to the dredging of the river by the government.

As such will be welcome news to the people of Rahway, and especially to those who desire that it be made navigable for freight purposes.

Senator Briggs can be depended upon to follow up on this work, and the Board of Trade should get in touch with him promptly and give him their aid and assistance to carry the work through to a successful finish.

This measure has special significance for the city, as it will be a great stimulus to the river and to the future of the city.

It was not until shipping through from a point somewhere near the Monroe and Street bridge to New York and the markets of the world, there is no question but that this city will remain the supremacy over the entire river.

When the Rahway river runs again, we will see Plainfield, and Westfield, and the other communities getting their goods and sending their commodities through the Rahway.

And that will mean a great stimulus to our business and shops here in itself. Then the improvement is bound to bring new industries to this section.

This note has been emphasized all through the various discussions of the project that have been so numerous of late.

The movement to have the river dredged to a navigable depth, the RECORD has realized from the start that there was this much to be gained, that proposal to have the work done would meet with enthusiastic support.

Some new members are by confession of faith and one by letter united with the First Presbyterian church last Sunday.

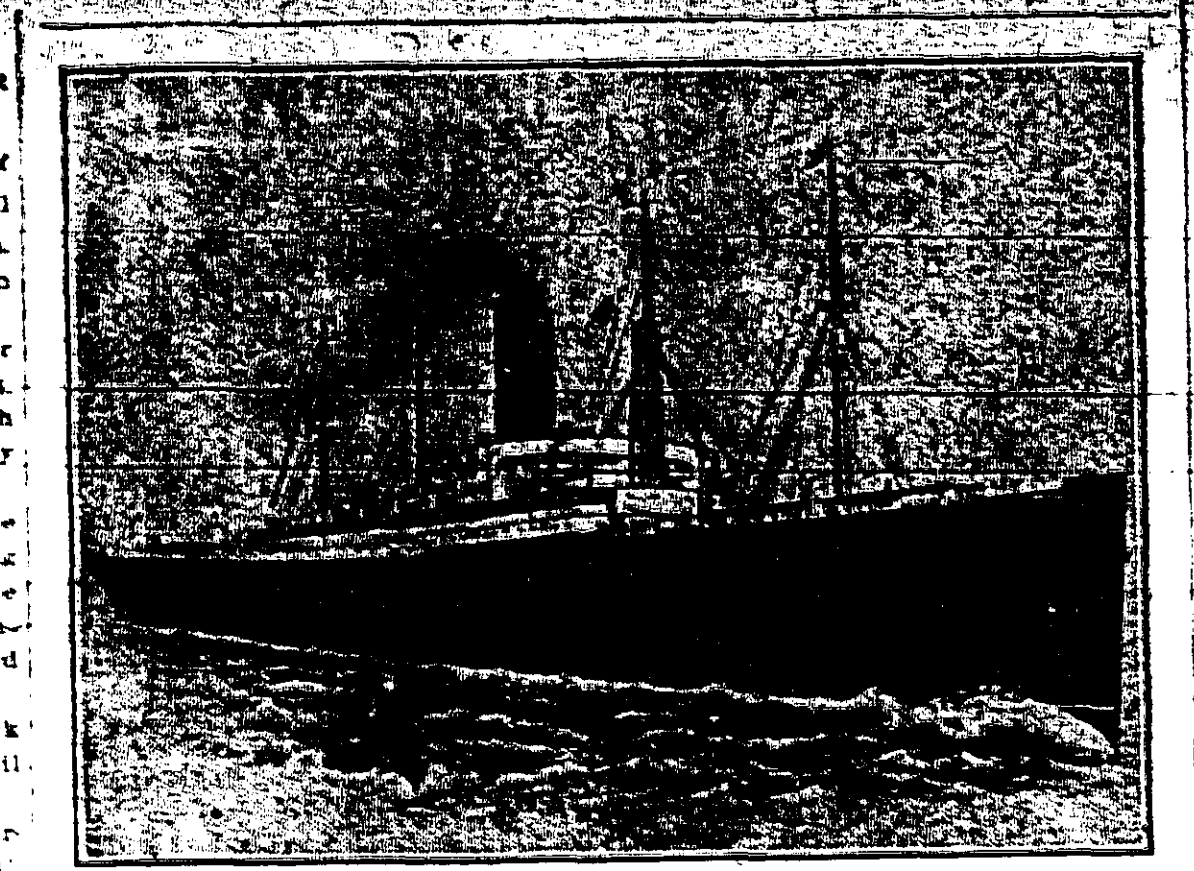
The Winterpool club class under Mrs. J. B. Strong is giving to the Rivers and Harbors Bill, appropriating money for a survey of the Rahway river.
