Trenton, N. J., April 29.—One of the remarkable documents which have figured in the criminal case of the state is a brief prepared by Alphonse M'Farland in his own behalf during his confinement in the state prison at Trenton. It is a document which has been filed with the court of appeals, which is reviewing the conviction.

M'Farland was found guilty of administering a deadly dose of potassium to his wife, the state's contention being that he passed the poison in a letter which he wrote to her while she was in the state prison at Trenton. M'Farland declares that the letters were presented in such a way as to prejudice the jury against him, and that he can prove that his wife died by her own hand.

WIFE'S PLEA SAVES HUSBAND FROM JAIL

Faithful Little Woman Pays
Fine For Man Who Mal-
treated Her Frequently

Because he was intoxicated and
created a disturbance in his home,
called his wife vile names and was
generally abusive, Mike Potoka of 35
Leesville Avenue, was arrested last
night on complaint of his wife and
this morning in Police Court was in-
dicted \$5 by Judge John W. Buckley, for
the alternative of passing ninety days
in the county jail. His wife finally
paid the fine and Potoka was allowed
to go with a severe warning by the
court that he must not maltreat his
wife under penalty of a severe term
in prison.

A history of almost unbelievable
brutality was told in court. It seems
that Mary Potoka, the wife, was tak-
ing the alternative of passing ninety days
in the county jail. His wife finally
paid the fine and Potoka was allowed
to go with a severe warning by the
court that he must not maltreat his
wife under penalty of a severe term
in prison.

Before the close of the morning ses-
sion, the wife was crying and said that
she would slap her face if she did not
shut up. He gave her one cent to her
in her extremity. The wife, near
the door, said that her husband had
been in the hospital for some time
because of his wife's treatment of
him. She said that she was suffering
from his treatment and that she was
in the hospital for some time.

Mary Potoka was taken to the hos-
pital in Elizabeth where she remained
between life and death for some time.
She was discharged from the hospital
in October, over a month later, and re-
turned to her husband who had mal-
treated her so badly.

In Police Court this morning Mrs.
Potoka told tales of cruelty that seem
almost unbelievable. She said that
when her husband worked, he kept
all the money and spent it for drink.
She said that he came home all the
time drunk and abusive and that her
life was one long terror. When her
husband was not working, she said,
he slept all day and drank all night,
getting money from her for the pur-
pose.

Asked by Judge Buckley if she
wanted her husband to go to jail for
a year, the faithful little woman has-
tated and said that that was a very
long time. Finally the court ordered
a light sentence and the little woman,
who has a young child in her arms,
paid four of the five dollars of the
fine. The other dollar was paid out
of the money which was found on
Potoka when arrested.

Last night when he came home to
dinner, she was drunk and becoming
angry, threw a beefsteak in his wife's
face. Her patience with his brutal
actions exhausted, she went to the po-
lice station and made a complaint.

Potoka will have to wait his wife
until morning to go in for a long
period at the next offense.

Tit's Appearance Defective
The following communication, relat-

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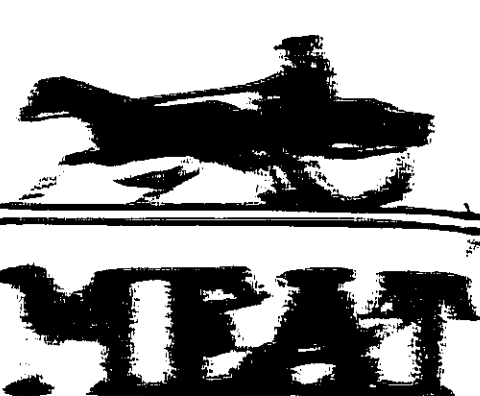
