## RICHESON TO DIE; FOSS REFUSES AID

Governor, After Hearing  
From Alienists, So Decides.

RATIONAL AT TIME OF CRIME

Avie Linnell's Blay to Be Executed  
Monday or Tuesday—Massachusetts  
Executive Says Clemency Would Be  
Contrary to Public Good.

Boston, May 17.—Gov. Clarence V. T. Foss will be executed some time next week—that is, after mid-  
night on Sunday, Governor Foss, after  
hearing the opinions of 11 alienists  
who examined the prisoner, read them  
carefully, and he decided the execution  
must be made that afternoon. Clemency  
would not be granted.

The exact time when he will be put  
to death by electricity, as a matter  
of discretion with General Bridgman,  
warden of the state prison. He is al-  
lowed the entire week to follow the in-  
structions of the court, but has not been  
in the habit of delaying his unpleasant  
tasks later than Tuesday morning of  
the seven day period.

So it is likely that the slayer of  
Elizabeth, the central figure in New  
England's most startling murder case  
of recent years, will pay the penalty  
on either Monday or Tuesday morning  
about 1 o'clock.

Governor Foss issued a statement  
in regard to the case. It shows that  
the opinions of all the alienists, who  
were employed by the state, by the governor  
personally and by the defense, agree  
that Richeson was not insane when he  
committed the crime and is not at the  
present time. The doctors informed  
the governor that while the prisoner's  
mood swings were mentally not of the  
best and he himself had exhibited ab-  
normalities at times, it could not be  
said that he was irresponsible when  
he committed the crime or that he is  
now legally insane.

The governor's statement in part is  
as follows:

"The evidence shows that Richeson's  
family is heavily afflicted with insanity;  
that he himself is nervous, is a som-  
nambulist and a neurotic; that he is  
subject to extreme emotional dis-  
turbances, marked by the loss of mem-  
ory, which two alienists have diag-  
nosed as hysterical insanity, one phy-  
sician adding the alternative term of  
hysterical delirium and the majority  
opinion indicating that these attacks  
are hysterical attacks marked by ex-  
treme emotional disturbances of brief  
duration, with loss of memory during  
the attack and a varying period fol-  
lowing it.

"The evidence, however, while clearly  
revealing these attacks, indicates  
that his crime was committed by him  
during such an attack. Therefore,  
while there is some divergence of opin-  
ion among the alienists as to whether  
these attacks indicate actual insanity,  
there is sufficient ground for the con-  
clusion that he is accountable for his  
crime and that the exercise of exec-  
utive clemency in this instance would be  
contrary to the public good."

FOR CUPID TO OBSERVE.

Some New Regulations For Marriage

Albany, N. Y., May 17.—The state  
health department is preparing to put  
in operation three changes made in  
the marriage license law by the legis-  
lature this year.

One amendment provides that the  
applicant for a license must swear to  
the statement of fact indorsed on the  
license application form.

From the marriage ceremony to police  
justices in villages and the third pro-  
vides that in the case of divorced per-  
sons the consent of the parent in  
charge of the minor about to be mar-  
ried is all that is required. Under the  
old law, the consent of both parents  
was required.

MRS. ASTOR GOING AWAY.

With Daughter Muriel, Contemplates  
Sailing For London Tomorrow.

New York, May 17.—Mrs. John D. As-  
tor and her daughter Muriel, it is un-  
derstood, will sail for London tomor-  
row. Mrs. Astor had contemplated re-  
siding here until June 1 and had on-  
going apartments at the Ritz-Carlton  
to that time. The engagement has  
been canceled, however, and it is be-  
lieved that Mrs. Astor's departure has  
been hastened by the appointment by  
Margaret Fowler of A. Percy Delaney  
as guardian for her daughter.

Mr. Osborn is an intimate friend of  
Mrs. Astor, and his appointment is said  
to be pleasing to Mrs. Astor.

## CLARK TO HAVE FULL IOWA VOTE.

Unit Rule of Convention Bows  
Out Wilson.

Burlington, Ia., May 17.—Speaker  
Champ Clark will have the twenty-six  
votes of Iowa in the Democratic na-  
tional convention at Baltimore, and  
they will be cast by thirty-two dele-  
gates with twenty-two votes to their  
credit. This was decided at a session  
of the state convention, the unit rule  
giving the assembly, despite the fact  
that eight of the district delegates  
favored Governor Woodrow Wilson.

Governor Wilson had won that many  
supporters in the nominating caucus  
held prior to the state convention, but  
they could not prevent the instruction  
for Speaker Clark. Bryan and Har-  
rison most sided in the fight against  
Clark.

Clark was won by a vote of 88% to 12%  
against the "Bryan" delegates, and  
the entrance of a big animal of  
that species furnished comic relief for  
intense factional feeling.

NO NEWPORT GAMBLING.

Governor Has Large Fund at Disposal  
to Secure Secret Police.

Newport, R. I., May 17.—Governor  
Fowler will prevent any gambling in  
Newport, this summer and as long as  
he is in office. Every gambling resort  
here has been closed for months, and  
the first violation will mean drastic  
measures.

The governor has a large fund at his  
disposal voted by the general assembly  
in secret session to police the coast  
and to see his orders are carried out to  
the letter. With all gambling places closed  
all summer the numbers of the cottage  
settlement will have to bring along  
their own gambling paraphernalia if  
they want to tempt Dame Fortune this  
year.

"DRY" TOWN CROSSES BRIDGE

Winthrop, Me., Population 53, Has  
Twelve Liquor Establishments.

St. Joseph, Mo., May 17.—Winthrop,  
Mo., said to be the "wettest" town of  
its size in the country, is to be limited  
in the number of saloons. The town,  
eighty-three inhabitants, including wom-  
en and children and the county court,  
has just issued licenses for four ad-  
ditional saloons.

Winthrop now has six saloons and six  
wholesale liquor houses. The members  
of the board of health declare they will  
issue no more saloon licenses. Win-  
throp is just opposite Atchison, Kan.,  
where there are no saloons. A bridge  
connects the towns and at night is  
nearly always crowded with persons  
going to Missouri to get a drink.

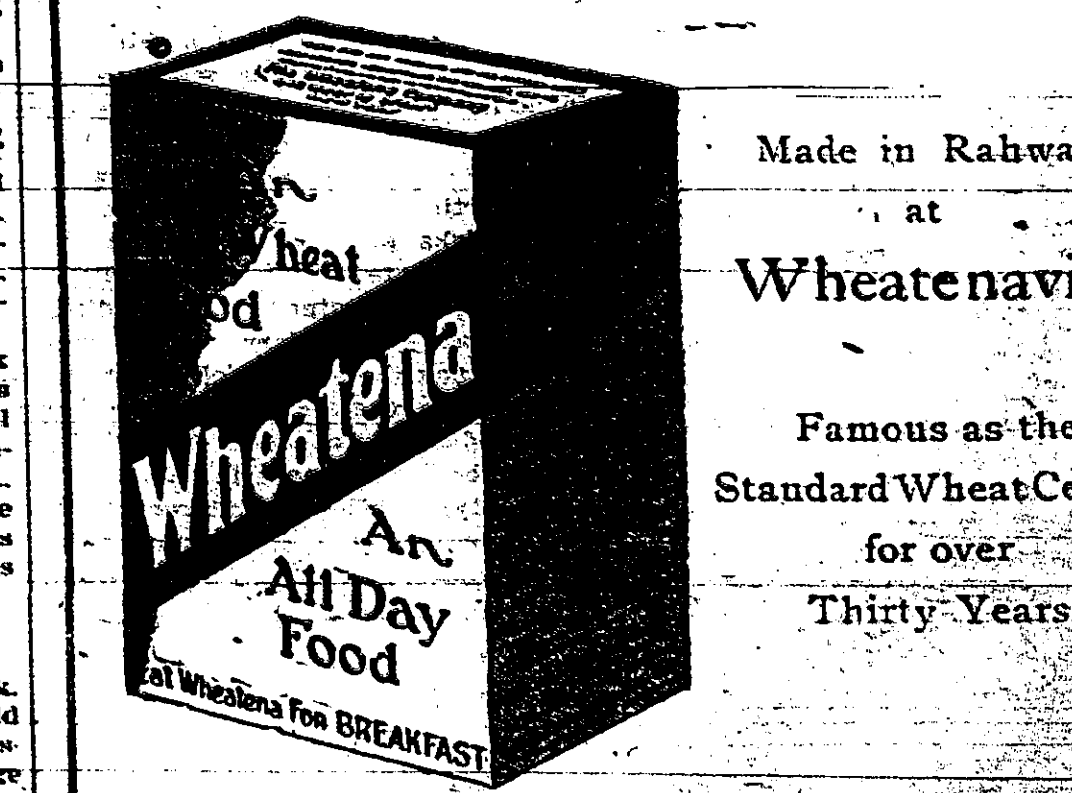

## FINDS WIFE AND 2 CHILDREN DEAD

Mother Kills Entire Family  
With Gas.

SHE HAD BEEN IN ILL HEALTH

Father Makes Discovery on  
His Return From Work—Rubber  
Tube Connecting Gas Stove Had Been  
Pulled From Pipe.

Elizabeth, N. J., May 17.—When  
Michael Muller returned from work he  
found his entire family, consisting of  
wife and two children, lying dead  
in his home at 433 Broadway. They had  
been asphyxiated by gas turned on by  
the woman, who had been in ill health  
for many years and evidently decided  
to end her life and those of her chil-  
dren.

When the man entered the kitchen  
of his home his wife was found lying  
on the floor, and his son, Thomas, three  
years old, sitting in a chair both  
were lifeless. His daughter Amelia,  
five years old, was found dead in an  
adjoining room.

A rubber tube connecting the gas  
stove with a pipe had been pulled  
from the pipe and the gas was find-  
ing its way into the room. The man  
called for help, and the neighbors rushed  
in a hospital ambulance was called,  
and the physician pronounced the  
woman and children dead. The  
body was seen alive by neighbors at  
3 p. m.

The county physician was notified  
and will conduct an investigation to  
ascertain the cause of the deaths.

**LOSES \$25,000; KILLS SELF.**

Woman Was Sister of George Rogers,  
Once Rockefeller's Partner.

Newark, N. J., May 17.—Losing \$25,  
000 in a speculative deal involving  
the purchase of a ship, a woman, who  
was believed to have originated the ven-  
ture in which his sister's money is al-  
leged to have been lost.

When Mrs. Woolley was found dead  
a diamond ring was on one finger. A  
silver mesh bag was wrapped about  
her waist, the bag containing 20 cents.

The woman's name and address ap-  
pear on a slip of paper in the mesh  
bag, which was found in the room.  
Relative claimed the body.

**WOMAN CLAIMS BURIED MONEY**

She Says Her Father Hid the \$10,000  
Found on Plainfield Farm.

Plainfield, N. J., May 17.—Mrs. Jennie  
Gieger of Plainfield, N. J., in a letter to  
James C. Carter, clerk of Union coun-  
ty, claims the \$10,000 recently  
found by William Myers and Pasquale  
DeLato on Union States Senator Mar-  
tine's farm.

Mrs. Gieger is the daughter of Frank  
Martin, who died recently in England.  
She says she was told by her father  
that he had buried \$10,000 in a can on  
a large farm in Plainfield twenty-five  
years ago. Mrs. Gieger says she is poor  
and a cripple and offers half of the  
money as a reward to the finder.

**WIFE SLAYER TO DIE.**

Will Be Executed in Trenton About  
June 17.

Jersey City, N. J., May 17.—Common  
Pleas Justice John A. Blair of Hud-  
son county announced that he has sen-  
tenced Joseph Schwabert, who killed  
his wife in Jersey City, to die in the  
electric chair, in Trenton, during  
the week beginning June 17.  
The body of the woman was found  
in the case following an ap-  
peal for the condemned man.

Had Boys For Burglary.  
Red Bank, N. J., May 17.—Ten boys,  
ranging in age from ten to fourteen  
years, are under arrest charged with  
robbery and burglary. They were  
taken from the ring leader, who is 17,  
and were released from the reform  
school. The boys were kept under lock  
and key by Recorder Redden for the action  
of the grand jury.

## KING OF ENGLAND.

His Majesty Caught by the Cam-  
eras Taking His Morning Ride.



**BODY OF KING IS  
PLACED ON YACHT.**

Escorted by Danish Warships,  
Sails For Copenhagen.

Lubeck, May 17.—The Danish royal  
yacht "Dannebrog," heavily draped in  
mourning, was seen out of Tre-  
mander harbor with the body of King  
Frederick on board.

Lowered upon Lubeck and the Dan-  
ish prince and princess stood on her-  
deck, making sorrowful recognition of  
the body of the slain monarch. The  
yacht was escorted by a fleet of  
Danish warships.

The royal family, which traveled on  
the train bearing the body from Ham-  
burg, was met here by the Grand Duke  
of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, brother-in-  
law of the slain king.

Danish naval officers lifted the casket  
from the train. Princes Harald and  
Gustav, sons of King Frederick, acted as  
cavaliers.

**EXACT BIG TOLL FROM CHINA**

Foreign Bankers Close Arrangements  
For \$300,000,000 Loan.

PARIS, May 17.—Foreign popular  
disapproval of the rate of interest on  
loan of \$300,000,000 by the six powers,  
now closed, was concealed.  
However, the toll exacted by the  
foreign bankers is said to have been  
huge. Only the unimportant details of  
the loan remain to be settled, and  
the first payment of \$20,000,000 was  
begun.

**REAL STAGE TRAGEDY.**

Jealous Actress Kills Actor at Perform-  
ance, Then Ends Her Life.

Berlin, May 17.—A real stage per-  
formance on the stage of the theater at  
Clichy, in Bohemia, an actress named  
Ludwig, who died recently in England,  
killed her husband, a famous actor,  
and then turned the weapon on her-  
self and died on the stage. The  
tragedy was the result of a jealous  
quarrel.

**Shave Must Inspection Inquiry.**

Washington, May 17.—The house  
committee on expenditures in the agri-  
cultural department postponed indefi-  
nitely the investigation of the federal meat in-  
spection service.
