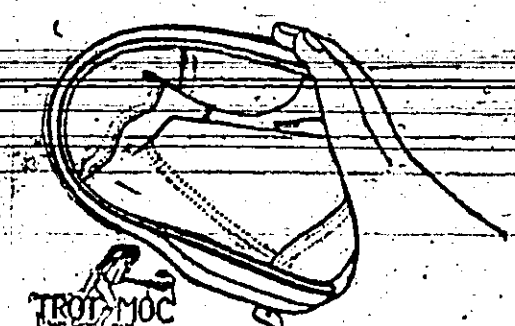

# COUNCILMEN ARE EXPECTED TO QUIT

Resignations Looked For Tonight at Atlantic City.

## GRAFT DISCLOSURES GROW

Mayor Bacharach Figures That by Getting Control of the Powerful License Board He Can Clean Out Disreputable Places at Shore Resort.

Atlantic City, N. J., June 3.—Nabbed in the Burns net to catch municipal grafters who are accused of having corrupted Atlantic City through holding up every kind of contractor, four councilmen, who have already committed themselves to taking bribes to allow the city to build a new "boardwalk bill," will probably resign tonight.

Two more are expected to follow and the men who have paid thousands of dollars to the city for the right to build a new boardwalk, will be expected to clean up the report book with the aid of Mayor Bacharach, to obtain absolute control of the license granting privilege for this year and half-political control of the three throughout portions of the resort.

Mayor Bacharach invoked. Assured by Burns that he has evidence enough to force the resignations of at least five of the five members of the license board, reformers have already called on Mayor Bacharach, who is known to be a thoroughly honest and in favor of wiping out every objectionable saloon in the places of the deceased men.

Councilman Kessler will resign from both the license board and city council tonight, it is believed. By the Burns backers that Councilman Mulock will follow the same course. This will leave on the board Councilman Victor Friesinger, present chairman of the board; Councilman Isaac Leonard, a chemist physician, who declares that he has had nothing to do with any grafting; and Councilman Mathias, one of the four who fought the boardwalk measure when it was up for passage.

The reformers believe that if they can have two good men named by Mayor Bacharach, they will be able to force transgressors in the local liquor business. Under the terms of the city charter, which was adopted by the new commission government goes into effect on July 1, the license granting board on June 2 and is completed by July 1. They figure, therefore, that by getting control of the powerful license board, even for a few weeks, they can clean up the saloon situation in a manner that will eliminate everything but the highest class hotel and cafe and saloon on all avenues of the highest reputation.

## WHERE THE RACING CARS END.

George M. Dickson, general manager of the company that builds National "40" cars, was recently asked what becomes of the race cars used in various kinds of road races, track races, beach speed trials, hill-climbing contests, etc.

"The automobile 'stable' is not like the horse stock farm," replied Dickson. "A man may buy many horses, and work out several of them and then at great expense and labor, he may develop from the entire stable one winner that can break the record. This champion horse is then sold at a premium, for a fabulous sum, and only one person can own the horse as it is in a class all by itself. Not so with our automobiles. Let us suppose we raced about twenty-five different types last season. It was about that number more I expect. As soon as a car won a race some one wanted it just in order to have the honor of saying he was driving the actual winner. So as soon as this particular car was sold we took another one out of stock and when it had won it was sold in the same manner. In fact, we sell all our race cars. Of course, our customers race their cars a great deal but my comparison with the horse is as good as logical as a winner as any other so we are perfectly willing to sell the winners and then enter another car in the next event. As a result there is no such thing as a collection of

race cars, or even a racing stable; we have simply an automobile factory where cars are built for sale and entered in races merely for the sportsmanship of the contests and the opportunity offered to demoralize the car's ability."

## HANDY HINT FOR THE COOK.

"With too many irons in the fire some will burn." This old adage of course is too true to the busy housewife.

She has forgotten to add water to the cooking food, and the odor of the burning meat, vegetables or fruit reminds her of the fact.

When this happens, quickly seize the pot from the range and immerse it in a vessel containing cold water.

The steam will escape from the outside instead of passing upward through the food.

Place the food in another pan and continue cooking or dress to serve.

The most critical person cannot detect a burnt taste in the food. This is a suggestion worth trying.
