The freeholder candidates are Chas. A. Trimbel, E. W. Phares and John H. Frederick of Elizabeth, William S. Martin of Rahway, Alfred M. Merrill of Plainfield, Peter Metel of Plainfield, George McGilvray of Linden.

The petitions of Robert H. Middlefield for mayor of Westfield, and of George W. V. Moy for mayor of Plainfield.

The following councilmanic petitions were filed from Plainfield: Abel Greenleaf, Fourth ward; Stanley E. Nelson, Second ward; Peter N. Erickson was named for mayor of Garwood by the Good Government League.

The Rahway Progressives filed their city ticket yesterday afternoon with County Clerk Calvert at Elizabeth. No candidate has been named for water commissioner, and there is no candidate for water commissioner in the Fourth ward. In the First ward the councilmanic candidate is J. H. Bushnell; Second ward, A. Lucy Smith; Third ward, Bertman Berry; Fifth ward, B. C. Ferrill. The names of the candidates for water commissioner practically assure the reelection of President F. W. Langstrath on the Republican ticket and give Harold S. Becker, the councilmanic candidate in the Fourth ward a much better opportunity of success.

HOLY COMFORTER CHURCH

Fair Will Be Held in Parish Rooms
Four Nights Next Week.

In the parish rooms of Holy Comforter Church on October 15, 16, 17 and 18 a fair will be held. A short entertainment will be given each evening with music. On the 17th a chicken supper will be served by the ladies and on the other nights a hot waffle broth will be ready and hot waffles with maple syrup will be served.

Engineer's Report.

The report of bacteriologist Phelps showed the efficiency of the filters to be 100 per cent in removing the bacteria coli and 99 per cent in the removal of all bacteria. The water rate committee reported progress relative to fountain rates.
