RAHWAY, N. J., JAN. 10th, 1885.

The Legislature organized on Tuesday afternoon as predicted last week, by the election of Mr. Gibbs President of the Senate and Mr. Armstrong President of the Assembly.

On account of the unusual length of Governor Abbott's second annual message, and the documents accompanying it, we are unable to give it a full report in our columns.

The following are the receipts for the year: Tax on railroad corporations, \$500,000; Tax on miscellaneous corporations, \$12,276 22; Tax on personal property, \$7,541 83; Judicial fees, \$18,498 61; Officers' fees, \$13,244 61; Insurance on State bonds, \$21,002 00; State tax of former years, \$13,295 30.

Balance in treasury Oct. 31st, \$1,256,466. Besides this there is due the State in taxes from corporations nearly \$200,000. \$10,248.92 of which has been paid since the above date.

According to the estimates for the ensuing year there will be a balance over expenditures of \$400,000. The Governor believes the State has ample resources to pay its debts, and he proposes to pay them as they fall due.

The Governor says he is satisfied that the best solution of the convict labor problem is to be found in the State House. He refers to the partial burning of the State House, and believes that to properly repair and complete the structure will require an appropriation of \$25,000.
