FOR THE PROTECTION OF PLANTS The protective mechanisms of plants. ofarns they are directed against aggressive animals, are to be looked for mainly n the neighborhood of the young growing parts or the reproductive organs. Not exclusively, however, but generally the older vegetative parts are defended by their own inherent qualities, such as their hardness or wirdness, which keep them from being suitable for the food of their assailants. Such young growing parts in many plants, particularly those growing in exposed regions, are plentifully supplied with thorns, spines, or prickles, rendering them in many cases extremely formidable. The thorus or prickles may be produced on almost all the vegetative organs, and may be enidermal structures, or much stronger in composition. containing obsiderable developments of woody tissue. These thorny plants are most noteworthy in desert countries, some that are met with there, notably the so-called "wait-a-bit" thorn of Africa, having spines of immense length, and being quite impenetrable by man or beast. - Cases are not of infrequent occurrence where even the lion himself is a considerable sufferer by coming into collision with this plant. So great is the development of the thorny allaracter in this region that Grisebach connects it particularly with desert exposure and scarcity of vegetation. A further peculiarity may be noted in connection with these plants: often the thorns do not occur above the point which is assailable by the animal in its search for food, while, when the shoot






