A VICTORY AFFAIR!

Considering the opposition and efforts made to defeat the Democrats in the election on Tuesday, the result is a grand victory for that party. Never before in our experience in Rahway have there been greater preparations for the opposition of the Republican party than in this election.

The Democrats still retain their majority in the Council, as the next Board will stand seven Democrats to five Republicans and hence all legislation will be controlled by the Democrats.
