

There is one good thing about the Knights of Labor that should be generally comprehended, and that thing is that no local assembly will be permitted hereafter to have any speial gathering or pic-nic where liquor is sold and no member will be allowed to dispense liquor in the name of an assembly, Add to this the fact that no saloon keeper can be a member of the order, and you have the creed of the Knights on the temperance question.

It is stated that Hamilton Fish and Lewi Pennington and F. H. Smith, of Newark John Kane, of Elizabeth, and Mr. Hartshorne, of Rahway, are the six surviving original stockholders of the old New Jer-scy Railroad Company. Under a resolution of this company, passed in 1885, all the early subscribers to the stock were entitled to an annual pass between New York city and New Brunswick. When the New Jersey Company passed into the hands of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, that corporation continued to recognize the rights of the old stockholders.
