Great proparations had evidently been made for this event. A large pine-board platform, without flags, drapery or decorations, had been erected in the middle of the Paseo. A few

rough wooden steps led up to it. Upon the platform was a curious upright machine, with a lever behind it and a rude chair in front of it. Around the platform, and close up to it, the soldiers were massed. Back of them, filling all the space away to the walls of the houses that inclosed the square, was the great concourse of people. CHAPTER LXXXIV. An Act in relation to past due taxes.

1.
