Public notice is hereby given that from and after the first day of July, 1910, it will be necessary for persons intending to be married within this State to first obtain a marriage license and deliver the same to the clergymen, magistrate or person who is to officiate, before the marriage can be lawfully performed.

Any person or persons or any religious society, institut.on or organization having authority to solemnize marriages who shall perform any marriage ceremony between parties without the presentation of a license therefore shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or_ both, at the discretion of the court.

Any minister, magistrate or other person who shall neglect or fail after a marriage has been performed by them in the city of Rahway, N. J., to transmit such marriage certificate and license within five days after the ceremony to the City Clerk shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars.
