

in solving business problems simply because they are able to look at each problem as an abstract proposition. The man who is close to a business Is prejudiced, even when he thinks he "fan't. If he is making a great many different things he is very likely to be proud of the completeness of his line and so the idea of reducing the number of his products is not likely to some to him. Again the man who has an immense number of machine tools thinks that he is carrying out division of labor and specialization to their iogical ends, and that whatever may be the reason for his high costs ! campot lie in specialization.

Then, too, the man who sees things "done-every day-in a certain way becomes incapable of looking at those things except as entirely proper and natural. 





The state of Ohio stands disgraced before the world. The lynching young man-barely more than a boy---by a cowardly pack of blood-thirsty "citizens"-God save the marki-at Newark, was one of the most brutal and wholly indefensible mob orimes of the many that have stained the records of that state. The young fellow, employed by the Anti-Seloon League with others, to serve warrants upon alleged illegal liquor sellers, was, according to newspaper accounts, pursued by a crowd of speak-easy patrons and symbathfiers and roughly handled. In self-defense, it appears, he shot one of his pursuers. But whether or not the shooting was justified, the fact remains that the victim of the lynching was in custody in the county jail, with no possibility of escape from the legal consequences of his act, when the mob [ same ratio. of fiends broke into the prison, dragged him out and hanged him to a tele-

It is fortunate that Ohio has a man of the calibre of Judson Harmon as Governor. Immediately upon news of the mob's crime reaching him, Governor Harmon left his vacation outing and started for the scene of the outrage. Instantly he instituted proceedings to make the ringleaders in the lynching and those officials who, by failure to protect their prisoner, were parties to the crime. suffer for their anarchy. It is high time that an example should be made. that blood-lustful cowards who so to make up mobs and chickengiszard officials who bow in craven obedience-to the worst elements of society shall have a lesson indelibly impressed upon them. Those responsible for the Newark crime are neither more or loss than deliberate murderer and must be treated as such unless our system of government is to be co fessed a failure and law and order are to be supplanted by violence an

#### NATATORIUM NEEDED.

That Rahway needs a natatorium everyone will acknowledge. That th M.C. A. has not the funds necessary to provide it is known to all. That we have citizens of wealth who could easily afford to provide such an institution is believed by all. That the erection of a public swimming pool would redound to the everlasting credit of the public-spirited citizen who makes the sift and that it would ultimately mean the saving of many lives is a foregone conclusion. During June, 1909, over one thousand lives were lost by drowning. Statistics for 1910 are not yet available, but that number will likely be exceeded. If the city of Rahway possessed a public natatorium the Board of Education would doubtless see the wisdom and necessity of employing a teacher so that every public school pupil could be taught to swin It might even be made a compulsory part of our educational system, as many more lives are lost annually from drowning than from smallpox, which we nndertake to prevent by compulsory vaccination.

Who will be the man to come forward and add to Rahway's attraction an institution so much needed?





Nearly every town of any size in New Jersey has a weekly paper, often of small circulation and limited advertising patronage. There is no wealth in such a business, and often only the barest livelihood. The work is severe, and ambition is rarely satisfled. Yet we can testify that nearly every editor and publisher of these local publications is a hard-worker, a man of conscience, a citizen of patriot ism, a laborer worthy of his hire. And the good that such publications do mated. It is far greater than is commonly supposed. They reflect the sentiment of the people of their district with an accuracy and an appreciation which all our wisest men recognize. and which does great benefit to the community. They can not all be freelances, they can not fight the great powers in politics and finance; but they can and they do reflect the conservatism of their readers with the sincerity of righteous men who know whereof they speak. Help them, not as a charity, but as a duty; give them subscriptions, sovertise with them when you can, and do not grumble if they get a little public pap, or a local office once in a while. 




