Councilman Bartlett, chairman of the Drainage Committee, reported that he had notified Contractor Kirwin that he must put Main street in proper condition, according to the specifications of his contract, as a part of the sewer-work done by him.

DAY OF INDUSTRIAL ENGINEER IS HERE

The Man Who Is Too Close to His Business Needs Help—He is Usually Prejudiced.

A certain manufacturing concern had an investment of \$800,000. With this investment it was producing \$900,000 worth of goods a year. The men at the head of the business knew that they were making a poor showing, but to save their lives they couldn't figure out why they didn't do better, nor could they see any way to make more efficient use of the investment.

Finally the concern called in an Eastern industrial engineer. The engineer looked the plant over and studied it a while. Then he recommended that the concern spend \$50,000 more and he gave his reasons. The concern did so. The next year it was able to show a production of \$1,800,000 worth of goods—nearly twice what it had been doing.

The engineer had been able to see things that the owners could not see, simply because they were too close to their problem and because they did not understand the science of production.

Now the average business man has an idea that nobody can possibly be as well qualified to solve the problems of his business as he is. The average man reasons that he knows infinitely more about his plant and his machinery and his patrons than any outsider can know and if he cannot, with all the data at hand, solve a problem, then no outsider possibly can.

But the average man's reasoning is silly. When a man is sick and in pain, no other man in the world can possibly have so complete and vivid a knowledge of the intensity, location and character of his ailment as the man himself. Yet when the doctor comes with a few questions and a very few lines and having answers enable the physician to diagnose the ailment.

The doctor knows the science of medicine—and the patient doesn't. And so the industrial engineer knows the science of production and of business—while the average business man does not. That is why the doctor can advise the patient by correct diagnosis and it also explains why the business man is surprised when the engineer solves the problem that the business man considered beyond solution.

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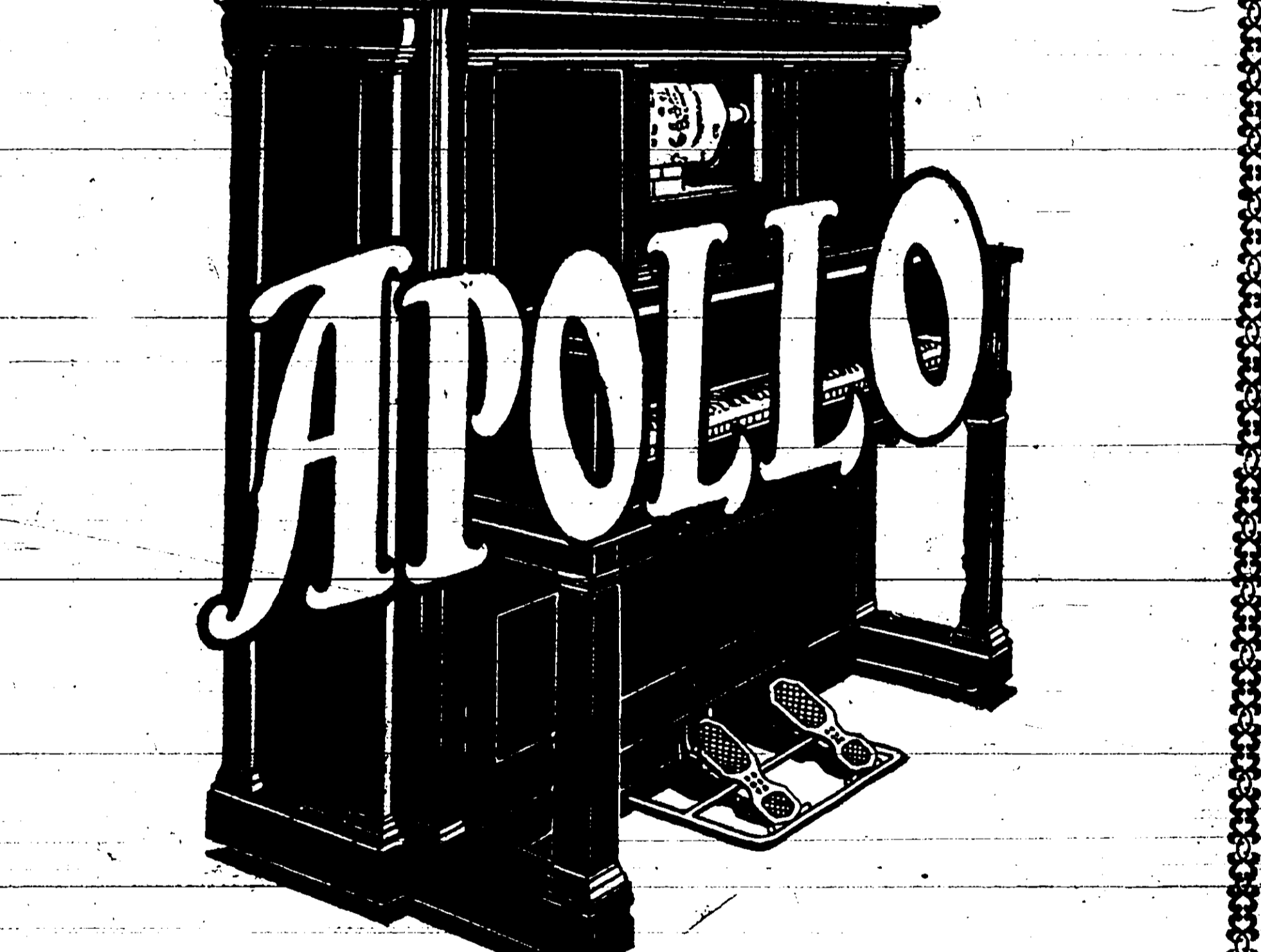

Richard Skinner—His Origin, Life and Death. To the Editor of the News-Herald: A short time ago you had in your paper a reference to the grave of my great-great-grandfather, Richard Skinner, printing the quaint epitaph cut thereon. May I give you some data of his origin, life and death?

Richard Skinner, the third child of John Skinner, known in history as "Blind" Richard Skinner, was born in the "Blind" lot in the Rahway Cemetery. Captain Skinner's home was at what is now Colonia. His lands extended up the Dover road. He married Sarah Britton, of the town of New Jersey, daughter of Nicholas Stillwell, an officer in the Indian wars, who came from England in 1633.

J., upon the expiration of the term of the officer receiving the same; that there shall be returned to said City upon the return of said badge the sum of one dollar as herebefore paid by said Special Officer at the time of his appointment.

Section 2. That there shall be appointed to such position as appointed a Special Police Officer shall deposit the sum of one dollar, such badge shall be issued for the term not exceeding one year, and shall be returned to the City of Rahway, N. J., upon the expiration of the term of the officer receiving the same; that there shall be returned to said City upon the return of said badge the sum of one dollar as herebefore paid by said Special Officer at the time of his appointment.

Section 3. That Special Police Officers appointed in conformity with this ordinance shall not be considered as members of the Police Department, and may at any time without notice on an opportunity to be heard, have his appointment revoked by the Police Committee of the Common Council, who shall demand the return of the badge issued to such officer, and all his powers and rights under such appointment shall cease.
