LOW LEVEL CAMPAIGN: Representative Fowler put his campaign on the lowest possible level when he attacked Senator Keen on May 23 in a letter which estranged many who had been the Congressman's friends.

I am in favor of the conservation of our greatest asset and chief resource, the American citizen—his morals, his health, his intellect and his just rights.

I am in favor of a broad tariff commission, to the end that protection may be guaranteed to the producer as well as to the consumer.

The obtrusive and offensive sign recently placed on Cherry street, combined with the number of sautoons on the short block devoted to business, makes the street one to be avoided if possible.

I believe that every grant of power by any state to any corporation carries with it the implied obligation that the power so granted will be exercised with reason, justice and equity.

Since the power to regulate commerce with foreign nations and among the several states was granted to the general government, it is unfair to compel all corporations doing a interstate business of a commercial character, to do so under the laws of the United States, resident in the general government of the United States.

I am opposed to a central bank and in favor of a financial and banking system in harmony with the existing institutions—one that will completely emancipate the United States Treasury from its present perils, that will base all of our bank credits upon gold reserves, and that will give us a currency directly related to trade and commerce, and convertible into gold coin.

Common Council, like other official bodies of the city, has become so accustomed to spending money that even the idea of a roll-cut on expenditures does not seem necessary.

A brilliant member of the Board of Education was overheard in a discussion of manual training requirements, to ask: "What do they need of a circular saw when they can secure their stock cut to size as required?"

If the G. O. P. gets a few more slips like those administered in the First District of Massachusetts, in the Rochester District of New York, in the whole states of Indiana, Iowa and Kansas, it may be that even old boss-toss New Jersey may awaken to the idea that there is an independent voice in the state which cannot be deluded by "Republican principles," "Democratic principles" and other faldors.

An octopusman on the Mills was overheard to remark that the campaign against the mosquitoes by use of oil had merely resulted in dwarfing the breed so that the ordinary screen is no longer a protection.

If the weather could be made still hotter for some of the statesmen who have degraded their states it would be equivalent to a breeze for the rest of us.

There may be no new party, but there will be many new faces in the next Congress.

BOY WANDERS FROM HOME

Eighteen Year Old Italian Youth Cannot Be Found FATHER HEART-BROKEN

If Not Found in Next Few Days, Searching Party Will Be Organized to Hunt for Him—Last Seen in Woodbridge.

Tony Del Cippo, an 18-year-old Italian youth, son of Gaetano Del Cippo, a watchman at Potter's Station, left his place of employment Wednesday night and since then has not been seen by his parents. The boy is slightly delirious, has a peculiar growth on his cheekbone and is partly blind.

For three days the boy's father searched the Italian section of this city and other places where the young man could be concealed, but was unable to find any trace of him. Saturday afternoon, however, word was received from Woodbridge that the boy was found. For two nights he had been in the company of the Presbyterian Church of that city, and when asked by Judge Dunn as to what he was doing in such a place, he replied that he lived there. The youth was placed on a trolley car and the conductor instructed to leave him at the police station. The boy was started on his way to headquarters, but evidently did not reach there. Later it was found that his face was severely bitten by mosquitoes. Since then no further clues have been discovered.

The boy's father is heartbroken and expresses his intention to organize a hunt if his demoralized son is not found in the next few days.

Middlesex Water Company in Quandary as to How Demand Can Be Supplied. People of Roosevelt Complain of Shortage.

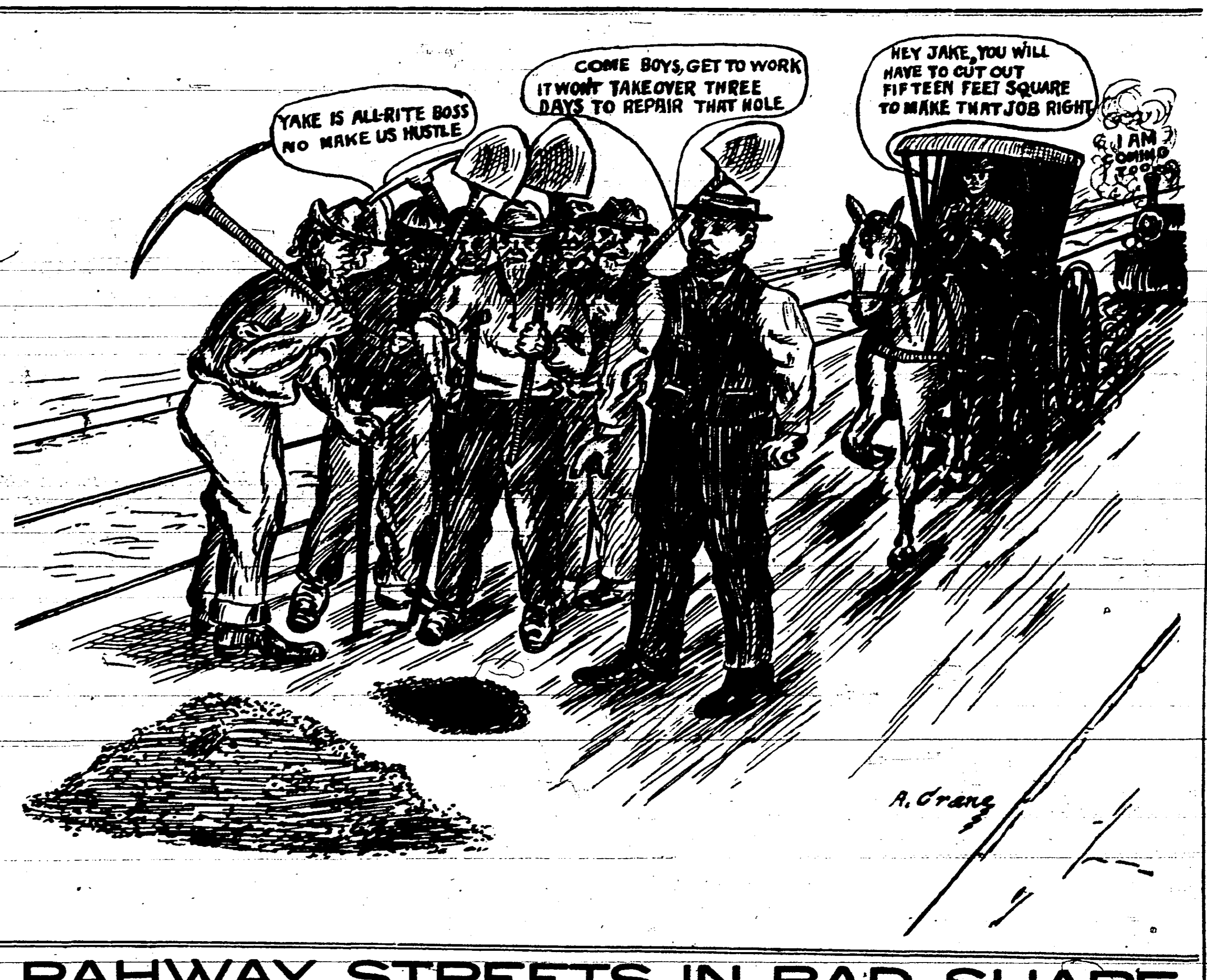
