

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

fairly accurate answer to the question whether or not this republic will-For the past ten years men of all grades of intelligence have been talking and writing of the "amazing wealth and resources" of this country. We have been told that our farms were the most fertile in the world, our factories the most efficient, our productiveness the marvel of all other

Yet all these years the government reports were denying every prosperity utterance and showing to every intelligent man who would take the trouble to read, that in 1900 the agricultural wealth produced in this country was only \$391 per worker, the manufactured wealth only \$901 per worker, and the average amount of wealth per worker only \$721.

If all the eighteen billion dollars worth of wealth produced in the United States in 1900 had been evenly divided there would not have been one family in this country well enough of to afford a plano. If the total wealth produced in 1900 had been evenly divided not a single soul in the United States would have been able to live in decent comfort, for mind you the \$721 worth of wealth per worker means far less than that when it has to be divided with those who cannot work. The census of 1900 took cognizance of a little over sixteen million families in this country. The total wealth produced that year divided among all the families would have given each family \$1,153 each or a little over \$225 for each individual, counting, as the census did, about five persons to a family. So in 1900 this country instead of bursting with wealth and prosperity actually produced hardly enough to properly clothe and feed its inhabithe average income per worker was \$438 in 1900, the country's wealth was not divided equally among all the people. In North and South Carolina for instance the average earning capacity was \$196. Every Southern state fell

far below the average. The highest average earning capacities were \$788 in Montana and \$704 in Arizona. That making a living was a difficult proposition in 1900 is indicated by the fact that out of all those who worked, more than one-sixth were women and girls. And lest you think that most of the women were engaged in light and easy work, let the census tell you that in the manufacturing and mechanical industries more than one-fifth of the employes were females engaged in manual labor. things stand when you compare the


