REAPPOINTMENT DILEMMA.

Republicans have something new to worry about. The constitution provides that there shall be a reapportionment of representation in Congress immediately following each decennial census. What bothers the Republicans is how to make a reapportionment without increasing Democratic strength. The House of Representatives has figured out that it will be their best partisan advantage to increase the basis of representation from the present figure of about 300,000 to 325,000, which would increase the number of representatives from 391 to 400, providing the census shows up the 300,000 population the experts estimate. On the old basis of approximately 300,000 population to one Congress member, the House membership would be increased to 400. The Republican leaders fear this would be disastrous to their party's membership for the reason that some of the heaviest gains in population are expected in the Democratic states of the South and Southwest. It is expected to gain so much in population that it would be entitled to four additional members of the House, and perhaps five, if the old ratio of representation were retained. Oklahoma also dares to make phenomenal gains in population, while Alabama and Georgia will also gain in representation if the ratio is unchanged.

But even an increase in the basis of representation will leave the Republicans in bad shape. The Republican New England states, whose gain in population has been comparatively slight in the past decade, will lose some seats if the ratio is raised, nor will the Republican states of the Central West show an increase in representation. The only hope for Republican advantage in raising the basis of representation is in the Rocky Mountain states, the Pacific coast and the Northwest. In those states they hope—but half-heartedly—to make up for almost certain Democratic gains in the South and Republican losses in New England.

Should the ratio of representation be allowed to remain unchanged, it is estimated that the South would gain about 25 representatives, while the North would gain about 35. But while all the 35 new seats from the South could be counted safely Democratic the Republicans would not be reasonably certain of more than half of the 35 new seats from the North. New York City would gain four or five new Congressmen, with almost practical certainty of them all being Democratic, and the Democrats would have good fighting chances in the new districts in several Northern states.

It is not to be wondered at, therefore, that the Republican leaders approach the task of reapportionment in fear and trembling, conscious as they are that, no matter what partisan advantage is sought, Democratic Congressional gains are a certainty.

There are now two groups of men in every voting precinct: the politicians and the people. Their interests are opposed; the one group is working nights, days and Sundays to corral the votes so that its members may secure the offices, the other, the people, standing idly by, watching the fact and making no stir to protect itself. In Rahway there are sufficient voters of independent thought and temperament to control the situation, but not enough with the requisite spirit to come out in the open and fight for what they know to be right. It would require but a small band of right thinking people to absolutely dictate the selection of candidates and the appointment of officials, but that band must be organized to say "adeo all thoughts of party."

The commission form of government is attracting the attention of all lovers of fair play and decency in municipal affairs. Rahway cannot secure such a desirable end unless the legislature shall take some action permitting it, but in the interval the control of municipal expenditure can be removed from party leaders and placed with those who have no other aim than to give the city a model and economical administration. Where are the men who believe this condition should be accomplished—what are they doing to aid the movement?

The following creed as set forth by Theodore Roosevelt must appeal to every man, woman and child who is not filled with the spirit of "Grab all you can":
 "I believe in property rights, but I believe in them as adjuncts to, and not substitutes for, human rights. I believe that nominally the rights of property coincide with the rights of man; but where they do not, then the rights of man must be put above the rights of property. I believe in shaping the ends of government to protect property; but wherever the alternative must be faced, I am for man and not for property. I am far from undervaluing the importance of dividends, but I rank dividends below human character. * * * *

There is general dissatisfaction over Mr. Wright's control of the funds which were subscribed to assist in the purchase of a new fire engine. The money was subscribed in most instances, with the understanding that it would be turned over to the city as stipulated in the agreement between the new engine company and Common Council. There was never any understanding that the thousand dollars should be held by a private citizen in order that he or the company should dictate the style of the engine to be purchased. Councilman Martin, chairman of the Fire and Water Committee, is quite right when he declines to have any steps to complete the deal until the new company has performed its part of the contract.

We have it on the authority of the Elizabeth Journal (quoted elsewhere in this issue) that the people of Rahway are "talking and wondering why so much money is being spent on the streets this year and little general improvement of the thoroughfares shown for the expenditure." The appropriations thus far for the year are \$11,500 and the tax rate will advance accordingly. Possibly the voters will approve of the selection of a street commissioner for political and family reasons and the employment of an assistant at the expense of the city so that the commissioner can attend to private business when he declines to have any one but himself to blame for the increased taxation. "Turn on the light."
