

TIBURON ISLAND.

Tiburon island. Tiburon is a Spanish word which, translated into English, means "shark." The waters around the islet are literally swarming with these tigers of the sea, and the inhabitants of the island are said to be no less ferocious than the sharks. Tiburon i peopled with a handful of Indians, the world, known as Seris. They are reputed to be cannibals, to be so fierce that none of the mainland tribes of Mexican redskins ever dare invade their shores and to possess the secret of manufacture of a peculiarly deadly poison with which they prepare their arrows before battle.—Wide World

OPENING OF THE GREAT PENN-SYLVANIA STATION IN NEW YORK.


