S. P. C. A. OPPOSE Muzzling Dogs

Members of The Local Branch Do Not Favor Ordinance TO PETITION COUNCIL

Meeting Held at Home of President - Members Unanimously Oppose Muzzling Canines During Winter Months.

A special meeting of the Rahway S. P. C. A. was held last Wednesday evening at the Esterbrook home of Mrs. G. C. Almsworth, president of the society, and who occupied the official chair during the evening.

The object of the meeting was to vote upon the adoption of the by-laws. This was done by a unanimous vote and the committee was discharged with the thanks of the society.

Previous to the principal meeting a session of a committee consisting of Mrs. G. C. Almsworth, president, and Mrs. D. B. Garrison, secretary, was held for the purpose of drawing up a petition to be presented to the main session for their action.

The gist of the petition as presented and accepted was that signatures of Rahway residents be presented to the Common Council at its next sitting asking that what is known as Councilman Bartlett's amendment to the dog ordinance be passed.

This amendment makes it unnecessary to muzzle dogs save during the months of June, July, August, September and October. The petition is to be circulated rapidly and as many signatures secured as is possible in the limited time which remains.

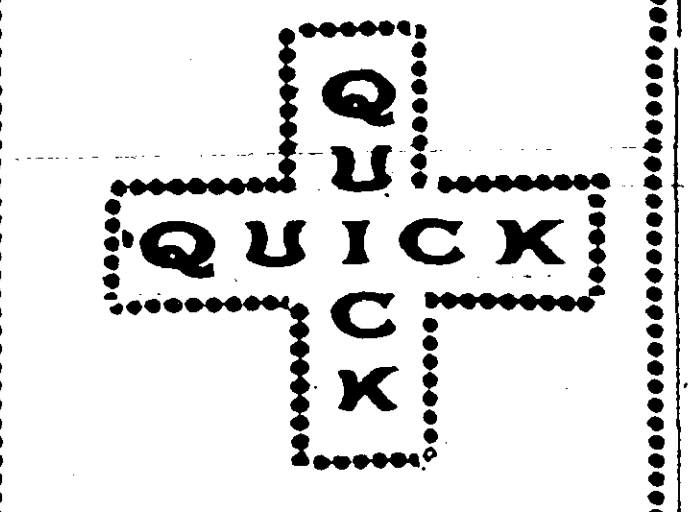

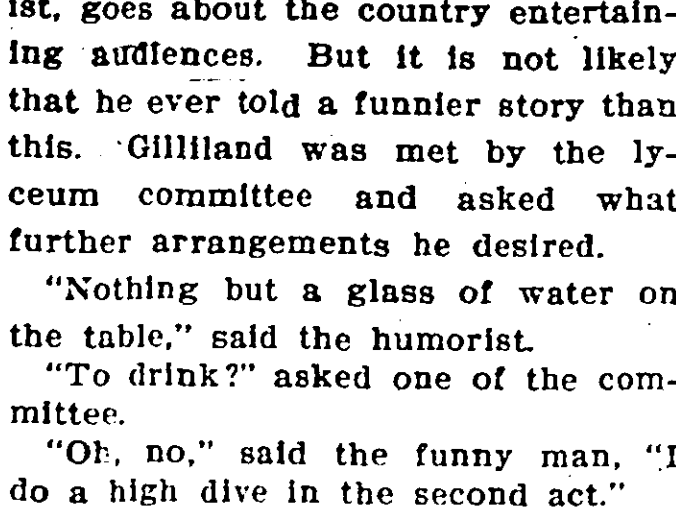
