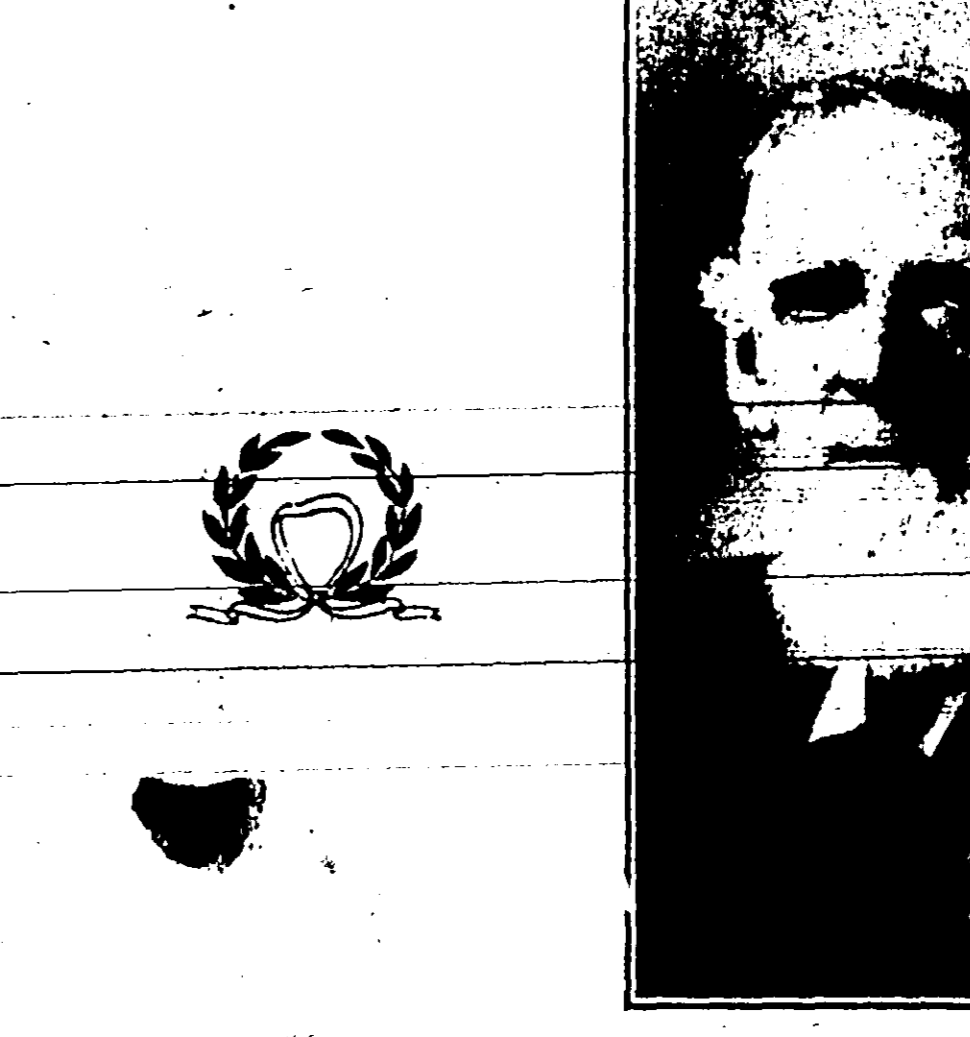

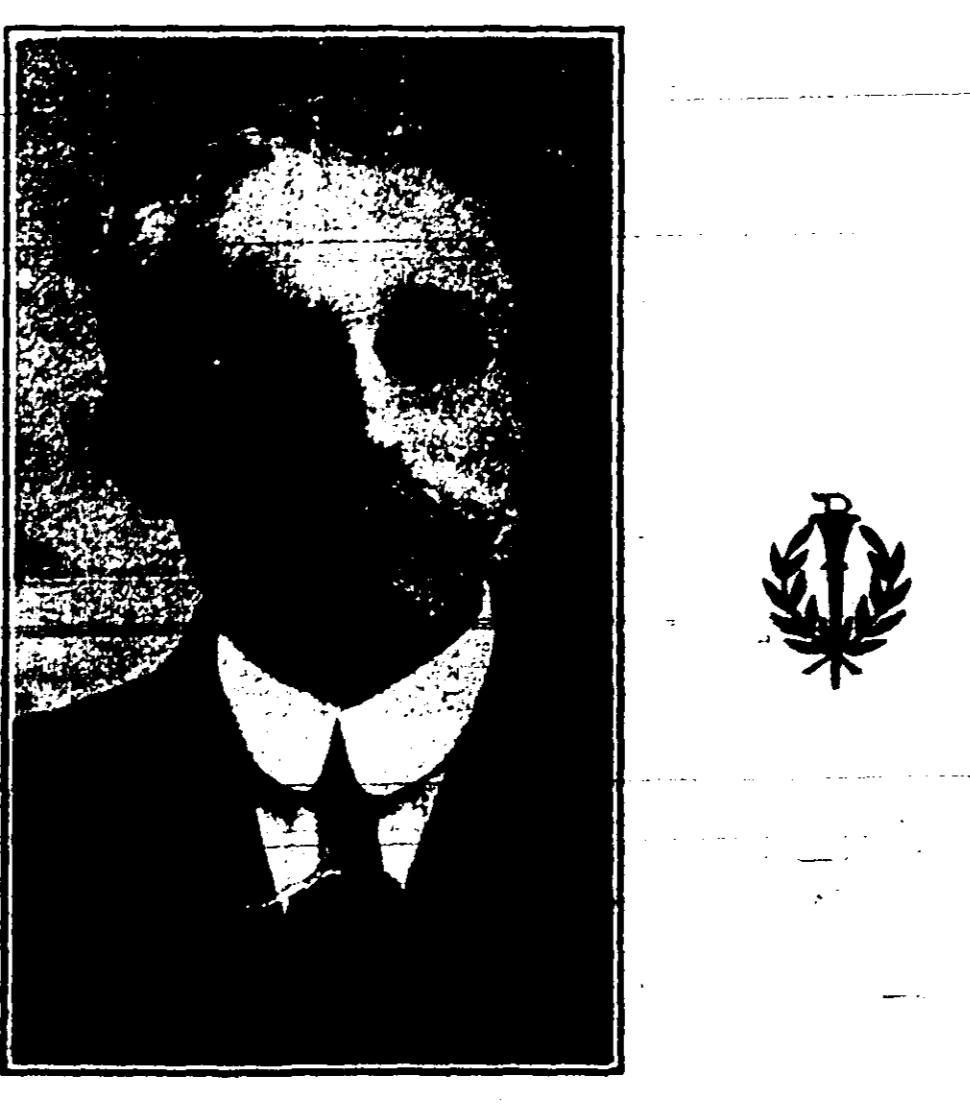

CABINET SHOP TO BE USED FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF NEWLY INVENTED COLOR PRESSES.

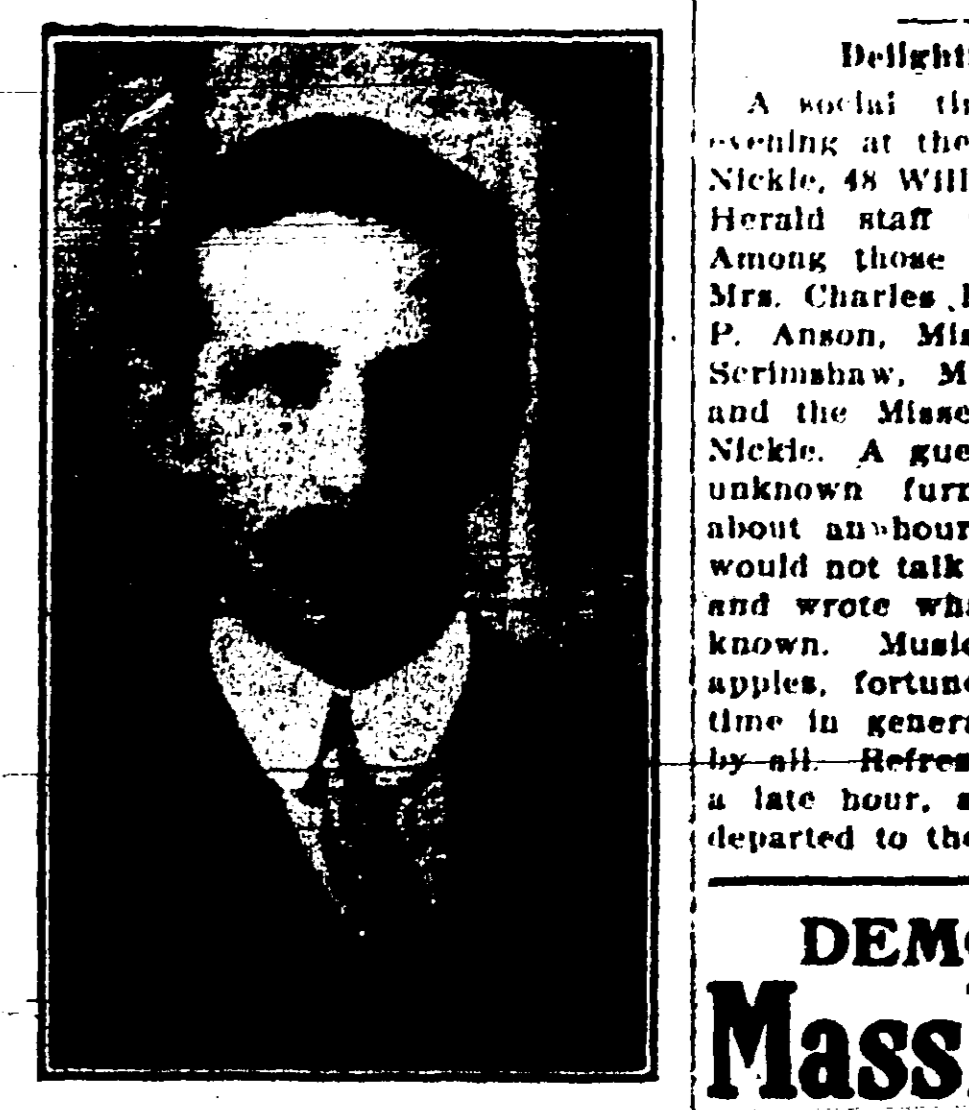
