RAHWAY RESIDENTS INTERESTED IN LARGE ESTATE

Certain Members of the Potter Family will inherit the Fortune of \$150,000. Mr. C. C. Potter, an uncle of Mr. A. S. Wilcox and residing at Marcy, N. Y., was a caller at the News-Herald office last week, during which time he informed the News-Herald of a large fortune amounting to a million and a half dollars, left by a Mr. Robert Potter, who was killed in Texas in 1844. Lawyers are delving into the records to accurately ascertain who the local heirs may be. Most of the Potters in the Eastern part of the United States have belonged to some branch of the Potter family, originally from Rhode Island, and it is said to be most likely that the members of the family in Rahway are to some extent at least associated with those who are probably included in the list of heirs to the immense estate mentioned above and which is constantly increasing. The entire estate has been held together without division awaiting a court settlement and it naturally becomes a matter of great interest to the various members of the family residing in this vicinity. Mr. A. F. Kretzen, the general Superintendent of the water department, is one of those who has married into the Potter family and by virtue of that fact becomes interested in the division of the fortune. His many friends in Rahway will hope that he and his family may succeed in establishing their claim to a part of it.

Ostrich Diet kills Hog

A hog belonging to Alton Meyer of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., was taken a few weeks ago to the Bloomsburg fair and quartered next to some ostriches. After being taken home again, the hog became ill, although there seemed to be nothing the matter with it, and when it died this week, a mere shadow of its former self, Meyer had it cut open to see if it was afflicted with any organic disease. It then became apparent that it had died of indigestion contracted evidently in a desire to emulate the appetites of the ostriches, for in its stomach were found a small pound of rusty yellow warts, several sections of tin cans and seven links of cow chain.

Lined 82 Years in One House

Miss Harriet Allen of Redbank died of paralysis Tuesday in the house at Shrewsbury at a time that some of her eighty-two years ago. She was a daughter of Mr. William Allen, whose practice called him from "Highland" to the "New River." The Allen homestead in which she died was built by Dr. Allen during the Revolutionary period. It was in this house that during an engagement between some English and American soldiers at Shrewsbury at a time that some of the wounded were taken and laid on the floor, where blood stains were made. It is said they are still visible.

3241 Persons Killed on Railroads

Killed, 3284; injured, 82,374. This is the casualty record of accidents in the United States during the year ended June 30 last, according to the report of the Interstate Commerce Commission. It is an increase of 1,013 in the number killed and 18,153 in the number injured over the previous year. There were 3241 deaths, killing 425 persons and injuring 7,565 and damaging railroad property to the extent of \$4,826,728. In the year 1909, 5,910 derailleurs, 340 persons were killed and 4,814 injured. During the last three months of the year the total killed or injured was 20,650.

Rat Trap Saves Two Lives

Awakened by the snap of a rat trap and the squeals of a big rodent, Andrew Sullivan, of Burlington, N. J., awoke to find his home in flames. Jumping from a window, clad only in his nightclothes, he and his wife barely escaped. The house was burned to the ground, the Sullivan family short of nine inches in circumference. The smallest catches a rat under two pounds.

Large Snake Escapes

A 25-foot boa constrictor created a panic in Laguna Park, San Francisco, when it suddenly decided to "act" for its photo. Its keeper and photographers had taken it from its cage and hung it up in a tree for an effective picture. When the big snake became weary of posing, slid down and vanished in the shrubbery. For more than an hour a futile hunt was made for the reptile. Then an alarm was sent out warning everyone to get that part of the park a wide-beret.

Curb the Money Power

The power of money has become a menace to established American institutions. It can be curbed only as is now being attempted in Pennsylvania by restricting the liberal application on the carpet and making them prove that their vast campaign contributions have been legitimately expended, or suffer the consequences. There are clauses in the Pennsylvania direct primary act which specify clearly the legal limits in which money may be spent by candidates.—Fall River Herald.

Live Kittens Grow Together

A large cat owned by James Albone, of Middleport, N. Y., gave birth last week to five kittens which are all fastened along the length of their sides to one another, their heads all facing one way and they are perfectly in body and feet. All three being able to stand and walk at the same time. They are very active and bright and in their actions are not different from ordinary kittens. The center kitten, which is white, is the largest and strongest of the three.

Ejects Mother in Storm

In the height of the storm yesterday a constable decided to "eject" Albert J. Costa, of Camden, and ejected the mother and four children, the youngest of whom is only two months old and the oldest seven years. Costa was not at home. It is said he was back with his wife when the constable told Mrs. Costa she must get her hand over the money or be put out. She could not raise the money.

When Susan Blakeley and Paul Leach presented themselves at the marriage license bureau of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., for a certificate, the girl's apparent youth aroused the suspicion of the clerk. When questioned the girl admitted that she was under 21 and declared her mother sold her

Blow as Lights Go Out

In the midst of the excitement attending the failure of the lights on the North German Lloyd liner, Hoboken, following the arrival of the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm II., with a large number of passengers, Naum Kaplan, 45 years of age, from Ibbau, Russia, who was a second cabin passenger, died suddenly, and half an hour later, when the place was again illuminated, he was found stretched out on the pier.

Shot Meter Kills Two

Analyzable by gas that flowed from an open jar after money had been placed in a slot meter, the bodies of Henry Hunter, fifty years old, and his wife Mary, several years his junior, were found in bed in a lodging house in Philadelphia recently. The couple had been visiting in the city, the money furnished by the meter became exhausted during the night and the owner of the house placed a coin in the meter, accidentally starting the flow.

Man Buried in Family Plot

A unique funeral was held in Trinity churchyard, Morristown, N. Y., Saturday, when the body of Mrs. Eva Lauck, who died of cancer, was brought from Philadelphia and deposited in the family plot. Mrs. Lauck was accompanied by her brother, Lorenzo M. Hanson, who has the distinction of belonging to more jurisdictions than any other man in Morristown, and who carried the body of the man and deposited it in the grave.

Tenarches Two Skeletons

Workmen employed by G. W. Hill unearthed two human skeletons while excavating for a sewer at 161 1/2 West Street, Perth Amboy, Monday. They were less than two feet under the ground. One of the skeletons appeared to have been in a coffin, and was crumpled bits of wood were found surrounding it. It is believed the skeletons are those of Revolutionary soldiers.

Eight Potatoes to Half a Bushel

A gift from John M. Mitchell, of Greeley, Col., was received here by his brother-in-law, D. R. Sherwood, of Plainfield, in the shape of eight potatoes which weigh half a bushel in measure. The largest of them weighs nearly three pounds, and is just a little short of nine inches in circumference. The smallest weighs a little under two pounds.

Killed by Load of Dirt

Fritz Karmher, 50 years old, a driver employed in Woodlawn cemetery, was killed Friday in the cemetery when one of the wheels of his dirt cart slipped into a rut, throwing Karmher out. As he fell the load of dirt fell on top of him and he was buried. It was some time before he was discovered.

NOW THE DOGS ARE TO STAY MUZZLED

Five Councilmen Attempt to Pass Ordinance Over Mayor's Veto.

Also Authorize Purchase of Fire Steamer, When No Funds Are Available.

Anxiety to Railroad Important Matter Makes Councilmen Look Foolish—Most Any Schoolboy Could Give them Points on Parliamentary Ballgame.

Six members of Common Council have established a record for transacting business in record time.

Perhaps the fact that these councilmen were so anxious to have their special session may account for their having overlooked several important matters.
