



..." The universal opinion of medical practitioners is that even the most rigorous constitution is left in a weakened condition after an attack of discase, whatever that disease may be. An infection from any source and however slight leaves the victim with less strength to combat disease thereir the case of whooping cough, Dr. H. WEKnight, of Rutland, Pa., has

shown that the heart, which at the beginning of the disease had a normal action was left with a valvular lesion which will be a permanent menace to the child's life. The resistance of the child to discuse has been lowered tagious disease, no matter how mild it may be. If this is proved, it follows that the effect of the injection of a vaccine, whether forced on the people or taker voluntarily, is to lower the resistance to other diseases. Since the United States Army invaded the Philippines and introduced the practice of compulsory vaccination, tuberculosis has been terribly on the the requirements of the situation or offer an explanaion for it. Of course, they deliberately overlook the fact that vaccine and serums from diseased animals have been injected into the populace, which would be only a most natural cause of increased tuberculosis.

It is generally conceded that no religious denomination can claim the exclusive right to perform a marriage ceremony. One medical school is allowed to say that vaccination is necessary whether they like it or not. 

The records of popullation and harvests, which are the index of progress, show vigorous National growth and the health and prosperous well-being of our seas. These blessings have not descended upon us in restricted measure, but overflow and abound. They are the blessings and

"We continue to be at peace with the rest of the world. In all essential matters our relations with other peoples are harmonious. with an ever-growing reality of friendliness, and depth of recognition of mutual dependence. It is especially to be noted that during the past year great progress has been achieved in the cause of arbitration and the peaceful settlement of international disputes. "Now, therefore, I. William Howard Taft, President of the United States of America, in accordance with the wise custom of the civil magistrate since the first settlement in this land, and with the rule established from the foundation of this Government. do appoint Thursday, November 24, 1910, as a day of National thanksgiving and prayer, enjoining the people upon that day to meet in their churches for praise to the Almighty God, and return heartfelt thanks to Him for all His goodness and loving kindness.
