Mrs. M. Ackerman is having a whole lot of improvements added to her Oliver street bakery.

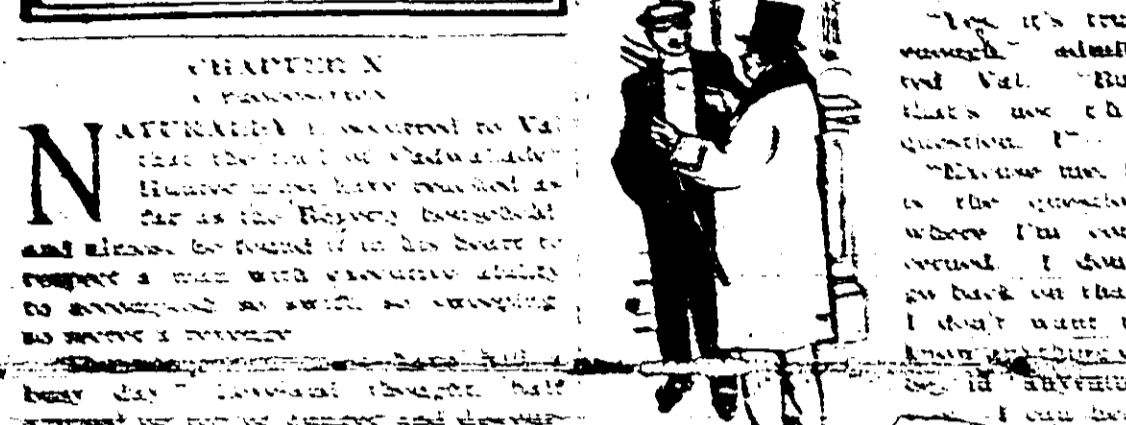
