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OBITUARY

Robert Preston Brown, postmaster of West New Brighton, died at his residence, No. 917 Post avenue, on Wednesday, December 7, after a lingering illness, the immediate cause being pneumonia. Funeral services were held in Grace M. E. Church, Forest Park, on Sunday afternoon, 11th inst., at three o'clock, the Rev. Chas. Waldron, pastor, officiating, after which the Masonic and Grand Army of the Republic ritualistic services were held at interment made in the Moravian cemetery at New Dorp.

Mr. Brown was the son of Robert and Sarah Mann Brown, and was born in Rahway, New Jersey, in 1844. He was named for Senator Robert Brown of South Carolina, who was greatly interested in the little city of Rahway prior to the Southern war. Mr. Brown received his education in the public school of that place.

For many years before the war he was practically a Southerner, and settlement and several business enterprises were conducted in the States, and he had become a great favorite with Senator Preston and his family.

At the commencement of the Rebellion, however, the Southerners all left for their homes, and he returned to his home in Rahway, where he was engaged in the construction of sewers with connections, etc., on the north and south sides of Westfield avenue between St. George's avenue and Jefferson avenue. He was, however, appointed to the office of Mayor Howard to assess Councilmen Trembley and Armstrong of requesting a clause in a law which would enable them to accuse Mr. Howard, it would seem, at any rate, that they have been successful in their endeavor to secure consideration of public affairs should prompt them to be more direct.

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State Inflicted Disease In Our Public Schools

(Continued from last week) In entering upon the discussion of a subject like this it is customary to state the principles upon which the law is based. In the case of vaccination, however, it is impossible to do this, as there is no consensus of opinion as to what vaccination is. When something is to be dispensed by law it is usual and proper that the thing prescribed should be specifically defined so that people may know what the requirements of the law are. The State prescribes some thing which is called "vaccination," but what that something is, neither the State nor any other authority has been able to define intelligently. Compelling by the requirements of a law which fails to define that which is prescribed? Under the provision of an absurd and unreasonable law which prescribes "vaccination" whatever practice they thought best met the requirements of the law. The practice schools, the Jennerites have not prescribed or defined? How are the people to know when they are meant? Jenner's vaccine, the source, the nature, character or composition of any one of the many varieties of lymph is not known. It is inoculated into the healthy bodies of school children under the name of "vaccination." There is no consensus of opinion. There are more than a score of vaccine "lymphs" at present on the market. Intentionally and forcibly lymph is implanted into the tissue of the human body. The elements of disease is a gross transmission of moral as well as of physiological law. It is tampering with the integrity of nature by entering into a compromise with disease. It is doing positive injury that hypothetical good may result. When we consider that obligator vaccination in our public schools is directed against the well and healthy, and against the sick and diseased, and against those who are in need of the services of a doctor, the utter absurdity and the injustice of this practice become glaringly apparent. Both the theory and practice of vaccination are in violation of the plain teachings of hygiene and sanitary science. The vaccine theory is a gross transmission of disease. The preparatory theory is a gross transmission of disease. It is tampering with the integrity of nature by entering into a compromise with disease. It is doing positive injury that hypothetical good may result. Under the silly pretense that it is a preventive of one acute disease, it has transmitted a large number of chronic diseases. I will now lay before you the facts of the case.

WHAT A DOCTOR SAYS

New York, Dec. 1, 1910. Mr. J. B. Furber, Rahway, N. J.: My dear Sir: Have read in the "World" about your controversy with the Board of Education in your city. Congratulations. Keep it up. Vaccination is a crime, compulsory vaccination a crime. Advise all your friends to sue the doctors for assault who vaccinate against their protest. If the patient is injured or very sick from it, sue for malpractice. If they die, sue for murder. During October there were several deaths around Philadelphia. Saw accounts of three in the "Recorder." In one case the coroner's jury brought in as a cause of death, vaccination, in spite of the effort to side-track it on that ground. I could tell you of many deaths that have occurred under my own observation—patients never saw a wall day from the time they were vaccinated until death closed the scene. Many of the incurable diseases, such as cancer, tuberculosis, insanity, have been caused by it; at any rate the notable increase of those diseases in the last few years is consistent with compulsory vaccination and the use of serum and the increase has been noted in the increase in the number of deaths. I am aware that the doctrine that "the end justifies the means" has been frequently used in the past to defend the defense and justification of a variety of crimes and offenses, and it will probably be so employed in the future. Since, in the very nature of things, it can never be right to do what possible good may come, it does not do justify the means.
