





The continued illness and absence from the department, of Chief Wright indicates that it is only a question of time when he will be compelled to relinguish his ardyous duties as head of the police department. The problem of securing the attention of the Mayor and others who are interested in having the department headed by a man thoroughly equipped to give the city that kind of service which it has a right to expect. In the selection of a Chief there are many points which must not be lost sight of, and the greatest of these is that the new appointee shall be a man who takes the oath of office with the intention and ability to enforce all the state and city statutes and ordinances without fear or favor. It never was intended that the laws should be enforced at the discretion of any ene man. On the contrary, the legislative bodies in adopting the codes have expected, and rightfully, that the various provisions therein would be enforced without fear or favor. There was never an intent that a man of wealth and influence should be allowed to evade any of these laws because of that wealth and influence. It was never intended that laws immediately after passage should become a dead letter. On the contrary, it is assumed, and rightfully expected that the Chief of Police of this or any other city shall enforce to the fullest extent every provision of the code, and if this enforcement proves objectionable, unfair or Unwise, it is the particular business of the legislative body to rescind that particular law and thus assume the responsibility which rightfully belongs to it.

Whether the Mayor shall select a Chief of Police from the ranks. whether he shall go outside of the police department is, of course, a question for him to decide. M; within the ranks, there is a man competent to question but that his acquaintance with the department will prove to be of some advantage.
